Miss Summers is a graduate of O'Neill high school, class of 1957.

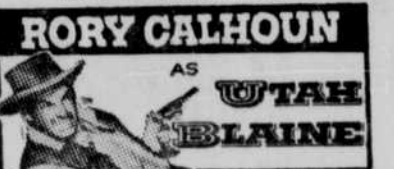
Entire Class Takes Part in Play—
