All of the activities of this organization seem to hinge around the office of the commissioner of education or F. B. Decker himself. It's difficult for me to understand how making this office effective will improve schools in Nebraska.

It is my personal opinion that if the group clamoring for the office of the commissioner would spend as much time, money, and effort to improving their own schools that they would be accomplishing some of the aims that should be implied in the word improvement.

It will be well for all persons, who will be faced with the decision of signing the petition or rejecting it, to study and determine if this act will actually accomplish what it's intended to do.

The state board of education consists of six members elected from the six districts. If we do not like the man these people hire as commissioner it would appear that we should talk to our member on the board and attempt to

remove him. If all of the districts would do that and the majority of their constituents opposed Mr. Decker, I'm sure he would be removed at once. Since this has not happened, it would appear that probably the majority of the people in the state still believe that the state board of education is operating the way they want them to operate.

Many people are interpreting the reorganization of school districts improperly. Reorganization thinking does not advocate the closing of all rural schools as many people imply. The intent of reorganization is to set up an Administration unit with a number of attendance centers located geographically to best serve the people in that community.

The education of our children is one of the most important jobs we have. It's important that we all work together and not work against one another in providing the best educational opportunities for all children.

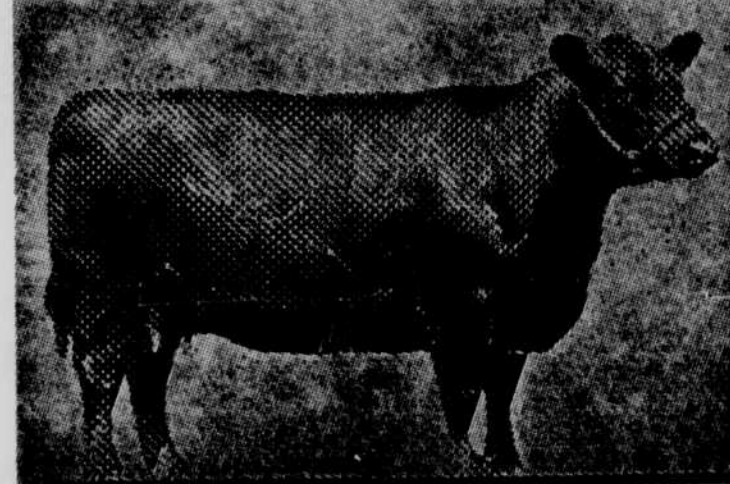

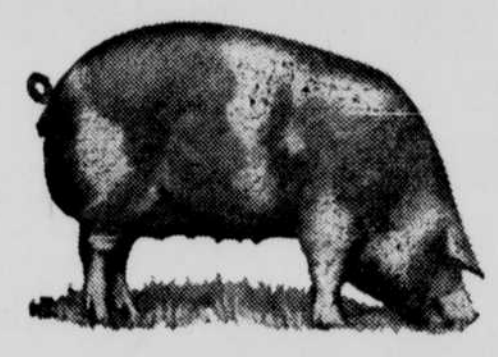
