A total of 297 regents scholarships were awarded.

At the Special Sale last Tuesday, cattle receipts totaled nearly 4,200 head, of which some 2,500 head were from the Charley Peterson ranches. 90% of the offering sold in carloads or even larger lots to what is believed to be the largest crowd of buyers ever assembled at a cattle auction. Experienced observers estimated the attendance at upwards of 3,000 people. New highs in prices are uncovered in nearly every class for the past 5 1/2 years. Some 1,500 head of the Peterson steer calves sold from \$30.00 to \$35.00 cwt. with an average of nearly \$33.00 cwt. around. A choice offering of feeders numbering around 800 head and weighing from 640 to 850 lbs. sold fully 75 cents higher at \$24.50 to \$27.60 cwt. Around 400 breeding cows sold from \$170.00 to \$250.00 per head. Butcher cattle sold firm to higher.
