

### Guards to Observe 'Muster Day' Feb. 22

A custom older than the nation will be reenacted Saturday, February 22, when the members of Company D 195th tank battalion, Nebraska national guard, will gather for the third annual "muster day" observance.

Capt. J. L. McCarville, jr., commander of company D, said the occasion will be marked by an open-house and equipment display at the O'Neill armory located in the basement of the Shelhamer Jack & Jill store.

Company D, Captain McCarville said, is one of more than 6,000 army and air national guard units throughout the United States and the first president on the date of his first president on the date of his birth. Some 375,000 Guardsmen will participate.

The term "muster day", he explained, is derived from an old militia custom which began dur-

ing the early days of the Colonies. Once every year every able-bodied man for miles around gathered on the village green for roll call and weapons inspection.

This year the citizens of O'Neill will do the inspecting—not on the village green, but in the O'Neill armory. Instead of flintlocks they will inspect semi-automatic and automatic rifles, machine guns, pistols, tanks and the latest in communication devices.

The M-47 tank will be on display at the intersection of Fourth and Douglas from 1 to 5 p.m.

Company equipment will be on display in the armory along with the showing of several sports films and a combat film of the 34th infantry division of the guard in action. In the evening it is planned to have a teenage dance at the armory from 8 to 11 p.m. Free coffee and doughnuts will be served in the afternoon.
