### Attends PCA Meet in Omaha

This week marks the 35th anniversary of the Federal Intermediate Credit bank of Omaha, it was announced by James W. Rooney, secretary-treasurer of the O'Neill Production Credit association.

The local PCA is a stockholder of the Intermediate Credit bank," Mr. Rooney said. "Since January 1, 1957, the 40 Production Credit associations in Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota and Wyoming have been retiring government stock in the bank, and eventually it will be owned cooperatively by its users," he said.

The Federal Intermediate Credit bank serves as a wholesaler of short and intermediate-term credit for agriculture through farmer-owned PCA's and other privately capitalized agricultural credit organizations. It was organized in 1923 as a permanent dependable source of operating funds for agriculture. During the 35 years, it has loaned more than 2 1/2-billion-dollars. Today the Federal Intermediate Credit bank of Omaha provides 150 million dollars annually to farmers and craftsmen in the four-state district.

The O'Neill Production Credit association serves Boyd, Garfield, Wheeler and Holt counties.

6 hard-cooked eggs	1 1/2 cups (4 1/2-ounce box)
3 tablespoons mayonnaise	1/2 cup packaged pre-cooked rice
4 teaspoons vinegar	1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon salt	1 1/2 cups boiling water
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard	3 tablespoons butter
Dash of pepper	3 tablespoons flour
1 cup cooked fresh or canned shrimp, drained and cut in pieces*	2 cups milk
	1 1/2 teaspoons grated onion
	1 teaspoon curry powder

Cut eggs in halves. Remove yolks and force through a sieve; add mayonnaise, vinegar, 1/4 teaspoon salt, mustard, and pepper; mix well. Add shrimp and fill egg whites with mixture. Set aside.

Add packaged pre-cooked rice and salt to boiling water in saucepan. Mix just to moisten all rice. Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 5 minutes. Fluff with fork.

Melt butter in saucepan. Add flour and stir until blended. Then add liquid gradually, stirring constantly. Add onion and curry powder. Cook and stir until sauce is smooth and thickened. Place deviled eggs on bed of rice and top with curry sauce. Makes 4 servings.

\*Use 1/4 to 1/2 pound fresh shrimp or one 8-ounce can.
