

Holt Included in Plains Conservation Program

The great plains conservation program in Holt county is ready to move.

Approval by state program committee of a list of soil-establishing, moisture-saving practices for the county was announced by C. R. Hill of O'Neill, who as leader of the soil conservation staff, is chairman of the Holt program committee.

Also approved were the rates at which the federal government will share the cost of installing the practices.

These rates, based on average cost of the work in this county, range from 50 percent to 80 percent of the total cost of installing each practice. Cost-sharing rates for Holt had been worked out by the county program committee and submitted to the state committee, which is headed by State Conservationist H. G. Bobst.

Hill said that the approval of practices and cost-share rates clears the way for first applications.

The purpose of the great plains conservation program, Hill explained, is to develop an agriculture that resists the weather extremes that are a constant hazard in the plains area. This will contribute to a more stable economy.

"The county program committee is looking forward to enthusiastic response to this opportunity to make a good start on this program. Our records in this county show that there's drought somewhere in the plains every year. When moisture is good is the time to get ready for the years when conditions are less favorable."

Indications are that many a farmer and rancher in this county is ready to take advantage of this chance for real help in getting a conservation plan on his farm or ranch, Hill added.

Foundation of the program is a complete soil and water conservation plan for each farm or ranch. The farmer agrees to establish all needed measures in his plan within a period of not less than three nor more than 10 years.

Hill pointed out that when the farmer or rancher becomes a party to the contract, money for the government's share of the cost is set aside for his part of the program.

Two hundred thirty-three counties in 10 Great Plains states have been designated by Secretary of Agriculture Erza T. Benson for the program.

GP-1—Initial establishment of permanent vegetative cover, 80 percent cost-share.

GP-2—Initial establishment of field strip cropping, 80 percent cost-share.

GP-3—Initial establishment of contour strip cropping, 80 percent cost-share.

GP-4—Improvement of vegetative cover on rangeland, 80 percent cost-share.

GP-5—Initial establishment of trees or shrubs for windbreaks, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-6—Initial establishment of permanent sod waterways, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-7—Constructing terraces, 80 percent cost-share.

GP-8—Constructing diversion terraces ditches or dikes, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-9—Constructing erosion control, detention dams, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-10—Constructing channel lining, chutes, drop spillways, drop inlets, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-11—Leveling land for more efficient use of irrigation, 60 percent cost-share.

GP-12—Lining irrigation ditches, 60 percent cost-share.

GP-13—Constructing wells for livestock water, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-14—Developing springs and seeps for livestock water, 50 percent cost-share.

GP-15—Constructing, enlarging, deepening or sealing dams, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-16—Controlling competitive shrubs to permit growth of vegetable cover, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-17—Constructing permanent fences, 50 percent cost-share.

GP-18—Constructing, enlarging, deepening or sealing dams, 75 percent cost-share.

GP-19—Controlling competitive shrubs to permit growth of vegetable cover, 75 percent cost-share.

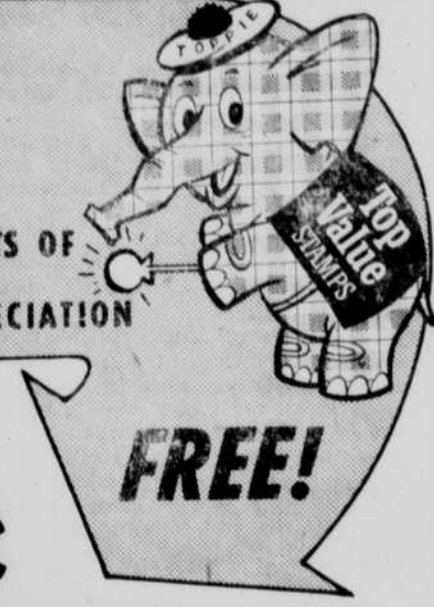
