**C&NW Asks Court to Overrule Commission**

LINCOLN—The state supreme court will decide the case of the Omaha to Chadron passenger trains of the North Western railroad.  
 The railroad took the case to the high court after the state railway commission reversed a previous stand and ordered the railroad to continue operating two passenger trains on the route.  
 Save the Trains association protested the earlier commission ruling that the trains could be removed, asked for a rehearing, and the commission then changed its mind.  
 It was February 7 the commission gave C&NW permission to discontinue effective March 15. The STA pressed for a new hearing, argued March 3, and five days later the commission reversed and set aside its February 7 order.  
 C&NW claims no evidence was introduced that should cause the commission to reverse its previous stand on the Omaha-Chadron trains that serve 43 northwestern and Northern Nebraska communities.  
 Two Holt countians are officers of the association: Cal Stewart, The Frontier publisher, is president; Ira L. Watson of Lincoln is secretary-treasurer. Several others are members of the board of directors or advisory committee members.

**Races Develop**

Political candidates for Nebraska's May 13 primary are hard at work, beating the bushes for ballots.  
 Some hot races have shaped up, especially for railway commission on the republican ticket, the GOP treasurer's contest, and in several congressional districts.  
 Eleven candidates, including a woman, are trying for the republican nomination for railway commissioner.  
 Four republicans are after the treasurer's post.  
 Gov. Victor Anderson has one primary opponent, a perennial candidate from Lincoln, Louis Hector. On the democratic side, it's Edward A. Dosek of Lincoln and Ralph G. Baker of Omaha. In the lieutenant-governor spot, incumbent Dwight Burney of Hartington is opposed by Marvin Griswold of Lincoln, on the republican line. The name Griswold is a vote-getter in Nebraska.  
 Hubbell Clair, a Democrat, and William W. Jurgensen of Omaha are trying for the democratic bid for lieutenant-governor.  
 Democratic candidates were plentiful and it was the first time in three years the party did not have to draft men to fill ballot vacancies.  
 Three democrats are trying for the nomination for senator, a post now held by Roman Hruska of Omaha, a republican who is unopposed: Frank Morrison of Lincoln, Mike F. Krieger of Omaha, and Eugene D. O'Sullivan of Omaha.  
 Here's the lineup for congress: First district — Phil Weaver, Falls City; Carl W. Deitemeyer, Lincoln; Eugene Cottier, Lincoln, republicans; Samuel Freeman, Hubbell, Clair, A. Callan, Odell, and L. K. Cramb, Fairbury, democrats.  
 Second district — Glenn Cunningham, Omaha; John P. Dalton, Omaha, republicans; John T. Salisteau, Omaha; Francis M. Casey, Plattsmouth, democrats.  
 Third district — Merle A. Haynes, South Sioux City; R. D. Harrison, Norfolk; Herman C. Christensen, Fremont, republicans; Lawrence Brock, Wakefield; Bert M. Evans, Bloomfield; Ernest Luther, Hooper, democrats.  
 Fourth district — Ralph Mead, Scottsbluff; Kenneth S. Gotobed, Kearney; A. L. Miller, Kimball, republicans; Donald F. McGinley, Ogallala, democrat.

**Board of Control**  
 The board of control, which governs 17 state institutions, has completed filling vacancies at three of them.  
 The board named Capt. Harold Smith of the state safety patrol as chief of the men's reformatory in Lincoln. Dr. Jules Nielsen, former superintendent of the Hastings state hospital, was required to that post.  
 And, at the Lincoln Children's home, Rev. Robert Rudell, associate warden at the state penitentiary, was named superintendent.

Robert Nichols quit as superintendent of the reformatory in a dispute with the pardon board over release dates for inmates. Dr. Jack Wolford, head of the Hastings institution, resigned to return to teaching in Pennsylvania, and W. O. Werner resigned without reason.  
 In the case of Lerner it is known the board was not happy with his administration.

**Education**

The problem of education in Nebraska and paying for it is going to continue to be a big headache in years to come.  
 Dr. F. E. Decker, state commissioner of education, said most school tax levies for the 1958-59 year probably will go up. Most school budgets are set in the middle of June.  
 County boards set the levy in August in all counties except Douglas.  
 Decker says he can't see how the levies can remain at present levels.  
 Of the 1957-58 school levies in 23 cities of 4,000 population or more, McCook had the highest—\$49.78 per \$1,000 assessed valuation—while Fremont was low with \$21.  
 McCook has a junior college in its district, while Fremont does not. Other junior college towns and levies: Scottsbluff, \$43.44 and third high among cities; Fairbury, \$35.83 and 11th; and Norfolk, 22nd with \$25.44.

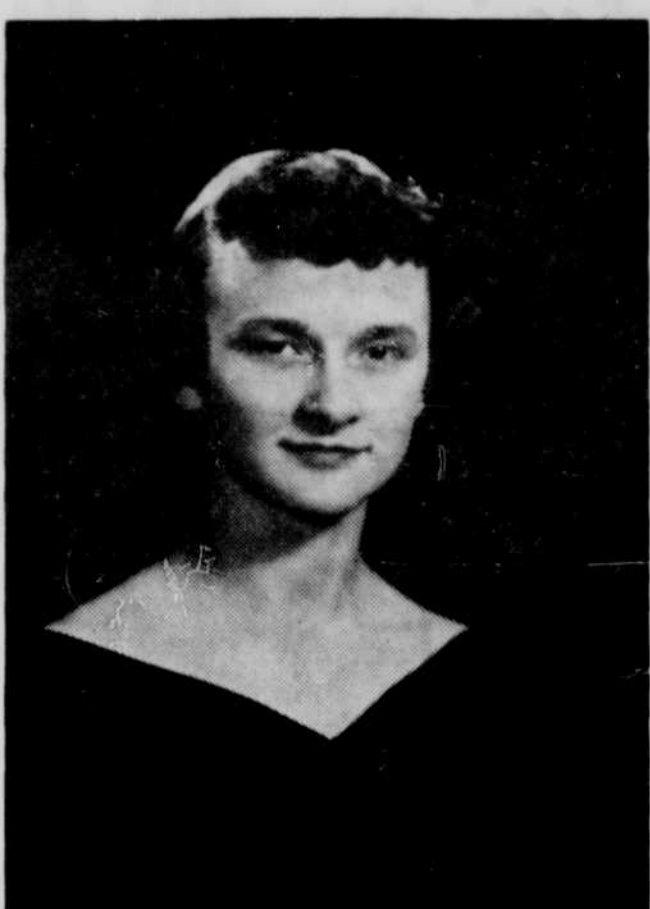
**Release Dates**

If the state supreme court would overturn a Lancaster district court decision, about 30 penitentiary and men's reformatory inmates theoretically could be brought back to serve sentences.  
 That many inmates were released when District Judge Harry Spencer ruled that the state pardon board had misinterpreted the law regarding computing release dates for inmates.  
 The attorney-general's office appealed to the high court. Theoretically, if the ruling is upheld the men could be returned, but statehouse observers figured this would not be done.

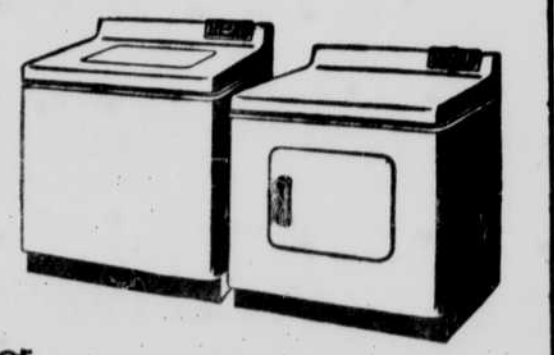


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
