Holt county voters went to the polls Tuesday in slightly greater numbers than two years ago but in fewer numbers than four

Unofficially 1,942 votes were cast, including 1,383 by the republicans and 559 by the democrats. Two years ago a grand total of 1,756 ballots were cast and four years ago the combined total was 2,602.
