1,942 Votes Counted in Primary Election

(Continued from page 1). Mike S. Kracher, 33. Morrison, however, won the demo nomination.

In the general election this fall, Gov. Victor Anderson, republican, will be opposed by Ralph G. Brooks, democrat. Anderson bested Louis H. Hector in Holt; 916-322. Brooks handily defeated Edward A. Dosek in the state but they tied—235 apiece—here.

Dwight Burney, who campaigned in Holt, barely defeated Marvin Griswold for the GOP nomination for lieutenant-governor. In Holt the count was 568-549 with Burney in front. On the demo side, Frank Sorrell hand-down defeated two contenders—Earl V. Baker and William W. Jurgensen. Sorrell had more votes in Holt than his two opponents combined.

Marilyn Jean Stroman, only woman on the state ballot, nearly upset incumbent Joe Brown for a railway commission GOP nom-

ination in a field of 11. In Holt she polled 190 votes; Victor Johnson had 132; Fred Sorensen, 128; Brown, 106; Carl Peterson, 87. On the demo balloting for railway commission, J. C. McReynolds received 257; Neil Nelson, 177. Thus it will be Brown versus McReynolds in the fall.

Wills Wins GOP Nomination

BUTTE—There were two surprises in state level balloting in Boyd county on the republican side.

Gov. Victor Anderson received a not-too-impressive margin over unknown Louis H. Hector, 290-118. And Lt.-Gov. Dwight Burney ran second to a vote-getting name, Marvin Griswold, 237-201.

Marvin L. Peterson easily outdistanced all others for state treasurer; Carl Peterson paced the field for railway commissioner.

Incumbents Ver. E. Tomek, clerk, Claude Collins, sheriff, and Lorin H. Anderson, assessor, were virtually unopposed, although there were some write-ins.

W. P. Wills of Butte outdistanced J. T. Murray of Spencer for nomination for county attorney, 386-129. In supervisor district 5, Grant C. Reber received 70 votes; L. E. Nagel, 50. Boyd demos liked Frank B.

Morrison for the U. S. senate and gave Ralph G. Brooks a 161-141 nod over Edward A. Dosek for the nomination for governor.

Harold J. Looek received 219 demo votes for county sheriff, unopposed, although Claude Collins, a republican, received 86 demo write-ins.

Lee M. Mathre, unopposed for demo nomination for assessor, received 252 votes, but Lorin H. Anderson got 83 write-ins from democrats.

Eva Barnes, unopposed for superintendent, received 806 votes.

Stockwell Wins Up 40 Years

BASSETT—Chet Stockwell, Rock county clerk 40 years, Tuesday night wrapped up his last election. He reported the republicans easily outnumbered the demos at the polls and held the interest spotlight.

Mrs. Mildred Haseh won the clerk nomination over Earl L. Anderson, 482-280, on the republican ticket. Nora A. Hopkins, incumbent treasurer, was defeated by Clint Davis, 433-337, for the treasurer's post. In the sher-

iff race, Marvin Kreitman polled 431 votes compared to 230 for Robert Swanson.

In the assessor race, Morris Brinkerhoff received 678 votes as republican incumbent; Wilma Peacock, 92.

For county commissioner in the second district A. O. Gurnsey received 183 votes; Carl Sporing 107; Harold J. Park, 70, and Lloyd E. Gandy, 48.

On the democratic side, Donald F. McGinley for congress received 55 votes; H. C. Carr, for county commissioner, Second district 40.

Mail Vote May Affect Race

NELIGH—Between 45 and 50 mail votes might affect the outcome in the republican race for nomination for county treasurer in Antelope county.

Theda Olney, incumbent, received 592 votes in Tuesday's predominantly republican primary; Carl W. Hemenway, 557; E. R. Peters, 255.
