

Addresses Canadian Doctors

Presenting a paper in Montreal at the 38th annual meeting and Congress of the Canadian Physiotherapy association recently was an O'Neill girl, Dr. Nadene Coyne, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh E. Coyne. She is director of the department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation for Cleveland's City hospital.

My mother's family was full of doctors and it just seemed natural to me to want to be one, too," Dr. Coyne stated. After a three-year pre-med course, she entered physiotherapy. After serving for four years as a therapist in military hospitals in the army, she went back to medical school at the University of Illinois and interned at Philadelphia General hospital. And now she is a specialist in physical medicine or a "physiatrist".

Physical medicine is used especially in the treatment of disabled persons. It tends to keep the functional level high of patients suffering from any illness or accident involving unpaired ability. This type of treating patients by physical means has only been admitted as a specialty of study in the United States since 1945.

When being interviewed by the Montreal Star and Herald, Doctor Coyne said that the future for a physiatrist is a bright one. "Since the end of World War II, hospitals everywhere are beginning to realize that immediate bed pa-

tient treatment for patients suffering from such illnesses as stroke can be in physical rehabilitation just one week after the onslaught of the attack," she commented.

Doctor Coyne, O'Neill's only female doctor of medicine, is a graduate of St. Mary's academy. During World War II she spent considerable time in England with the army nurse corps.

Her work on Cleveland's City hospital staff has taken her to Canada once, Texas once, California twice.

She has no plans at present for private practice, she tells her parents.
