Miss Birmingham Weds Mr. Riley at St. Patrick's

A very beautiful wedding took place Saturday, June 14, at St. Patrick's Catholic church at a noon mass when Miss Margaret Demaris Birmingham and William Hugh Riley of Fairbury were united in marriage.

Miss Birmingham is the daughter of Mrs. H. J. Birmingham of O'Neill and the late Mr. Birmingham. Mr. Riley is the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. H. Riley of Fairbury.

Very Rev. Timothy O'Sullivan, church pastor, officiated at the double-ring ceremony. Acolytes were George Shoemaker and Donald Schoenle. The altar was decorated with white flowers consisting of gladioli, asters and stocks. Banked on each side were stands of woodwardia, greenery and candelabra. At every fifth pew in the center aisle was a stand containing a bouquet of pink and lavender larkspur, pink sweetheart roses and white stock centered with a tall lighted candle. Garlands of greenery encircled the base of the stands.

Wide lavender ribbon was looped from each stand, connecting the first pew to the last. A large matching bow was tied at each stand.

The wedding party approached the aisle through a large archway which was covered with southern huckleberry. White stock formed a bell at the top.

The bride, escorted to the altar

by her uncle, William J. Froelich of O'Neill, appeared in a traditional gown of white hand-clipped lace over peau-de-soie. The bateau neckline was edged with seed pearls and sequins, which were also sprinkled through the entire gown and short sleeves. It featured an empire line created with peau-de-soie which extended to the back in streamers. The voluminous skirt ended in a chapel train. Her imported silk illusion veil fell gracefully from a crown of seed pearls. She carried two white orchids in a semi fan with lilies of the valley and streamers.

Maid-of-honor for her sister was Miss Barbara Birmingham. Bridesmaids were Miss Mary Louise Birmingham, a sister of the bride, Miss Mary Ellen Froelich, a cousin of the bride, Mrs. D. J. Becker, all of O'Neill; Miss Sally Anne Ralph of Emmetsburg, Ia., and Mrs. C. J. Gatz, jr., of Omaha, a sister of the bridegroom.

They appeared in ballerina length gowns of lilac silk organza. A lace bodice and wide cummerbund gave the dresses the same empire look as the bride's gown. They wore matching picture hats and shoes. Each wore a pearl necklace and earrings. They carried lilac fans with matching streamers. The fans were covered with pink sweetheart roses, pink larkspur, lavender fugi chrysanthemums and baby breath.

Daniel Riley of Fairbury was bestman for his brother. Ushers were Gene Erwin, William Nuckolls and Victor Schluckebier,

all of Fairbury; Charles Swingle and Charles Meehan, both of Lincoln, and C. J. Gatz, jr., of Omaha, a brother-in-law of the bridegroom. All wore morning suits and white carnation boutonniere. The bridegroom's boutonniere was lily of the valley.

Mrs. Birmingham, the bride's mother, appeared in a pink dress with a matching hat. Mrs. Riley, the bridegroom's mother, wore a powder blue dress with white accessories. Both had lavender orchid corsages.

Miss Sharlene Shoemaker, organist, accompanied Miss Mary Elizabeth Gatz. She sang "O Sacred Heart of Jesus", "Ave Maria", "Panis Angelicus" and "O Mother, Will It Always Be".

After the ceremony, breakfast followed at The Town House for four hundred guests. Two large pyramid urns made of white gladioli and white stock formed the setting at the receiving line. The serving table had smilax and white sweetheart roses encircling the wedding cake and lemon foliage extended from the base of the bridegroom's cake. Two fountains of pink larkspur, pink sweetheart roses, white larkspur and maidenhair ferns graced the table. Garlands of smilax with clusters of white sweetheart roses edged the sides.
