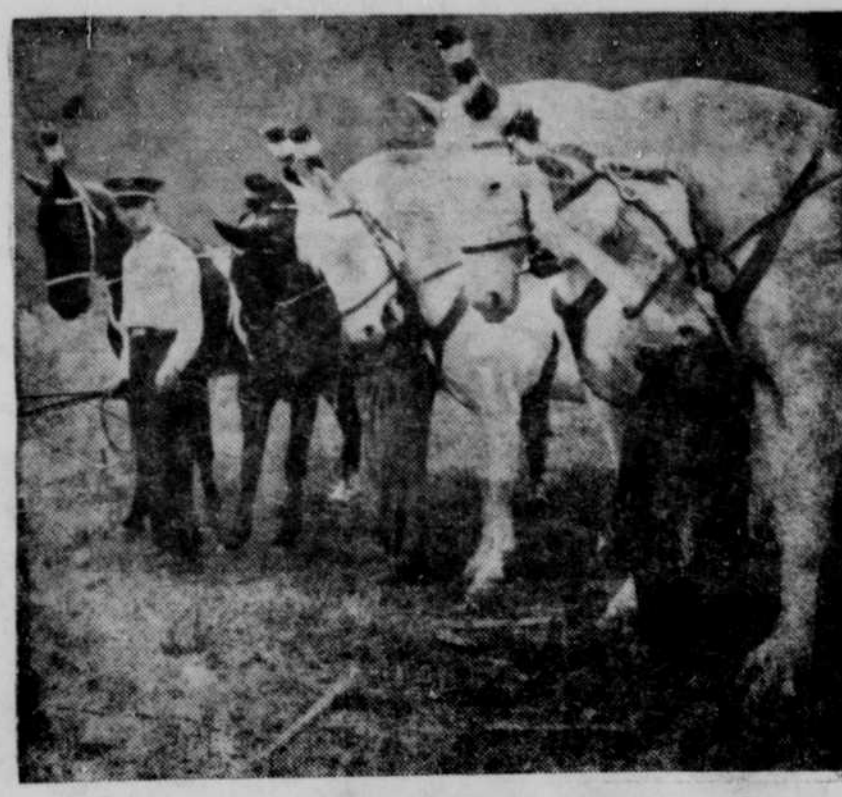

This recipe is so easy to prepare. The rolled oats are ready to use as they come from the box—no additional preparation is required. The mushroom flavor is added by the use of condensed cream of mushroom soup.

It is a good idea to increase this meat loaf recipe by one-half to have some meat loaf left over for future use. To prepare a quick main dish for a hot supper, slice the meat loaf into 1/2-inch thick slices and broil or pan fry until heated through and lightly browned.

Meat loaf sandwiches are so easy to make with a supply on hand in the freezer. Wrap individual slices of meat loaf in saran and freeze. This pre-sliced meat loaf is ready for sandwiches with no additional fuss—a help to the busy homemaker with lunches to pack in the morning.

Mushroom-Oatmeal Meat Loaf
2 eggs, beaten
1 cup rolled oats, uncooked
1 1/2 pounds ground beef
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 teaspoons salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
1/4 cup water or milk
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup

Mix all ingredients together thoroughly. Pack into greased 9 x 5 x 3-inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. Let stand 5 minutes. Drain off excess juices and turn meat loaf onto serving plate. Serve with mushroom sauce and garnish, if desired, with heated canned mushroom slices. Yields 8 servings.

Note: To prepare mushroom sauce, thin remaining 1/2 can of soup with milk as desired, and heat.
