1/4 cup water or milk 1/2 can condensed cream of mushroom soup Mix all ingredients together thoroughly. Pack into greased 9 x 5 x

3-inch loaf pan. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) 1 hour. Let stand 5 minutes. Drain off excess juices and turn meat loaf onto serving plate. Serve with mushroom sauce and garnish, if desired, with heated canned mushroom slices. Yield: 8 servings.

Note: To prepare mushroom sauce, thin remaining 1/2 can of soup with milk as desired, and heat.


