Steer Wrestling Can Be Routine, But . . .

Steer wrestling can be pretty routine. The dogger rides after the steer from behind the barrier as in calf roping. He has a hazier who rides on the other side of the steer to keep it from running straight. The bulldogger, as he's called by the cowboys, drops out of the saddle onto the horns, brakes the steer to a stop by digging in with his boot heels, then twists him down.

It's a timed event and the quickest time wins. Some of the best steer wrestlers in the business will be competing at O'Neill's big rodeo Saturday and Sunday, June 21-22.

Nothing difficult judging steer wrestling when it's an ideal situation. But what happens if the cowboy misses the steer altogether—as is bound to happen again and again at O'Neill's show? Or if the dogger gets out of the arena? Or if the dogger loses his grip and takes out after the escaping steer on foot?

Rules say the steer, once he's crossed the scoreline, belongs to the contestant regardless of what happens. Thus if an over-enthusiastic spectator downs the critter with a well-aimed leap (as has been known to happen), Mr. Cowboy gets another turn at the chute.

If the dogger misses the steer on his jump, like the calf roping the contestant gets another chance.

Occasionally the steer will stumble accidentally as the dogger makes his jump. When that happens the cowboy must let the steer regain all four feet and twist it down again.

Amateur judges sometimes consult the rule book a dozen times during a modern rodeo.

The most crucial decision the steer wrestling judge must make—and the one he faces most often—is calling time on the fall. The field judge drops his flag only when the steer is flat on his side, with all four feet straight and free, pointing the same way as the head.

The Gratten Hustlers 4-H club has been in session.

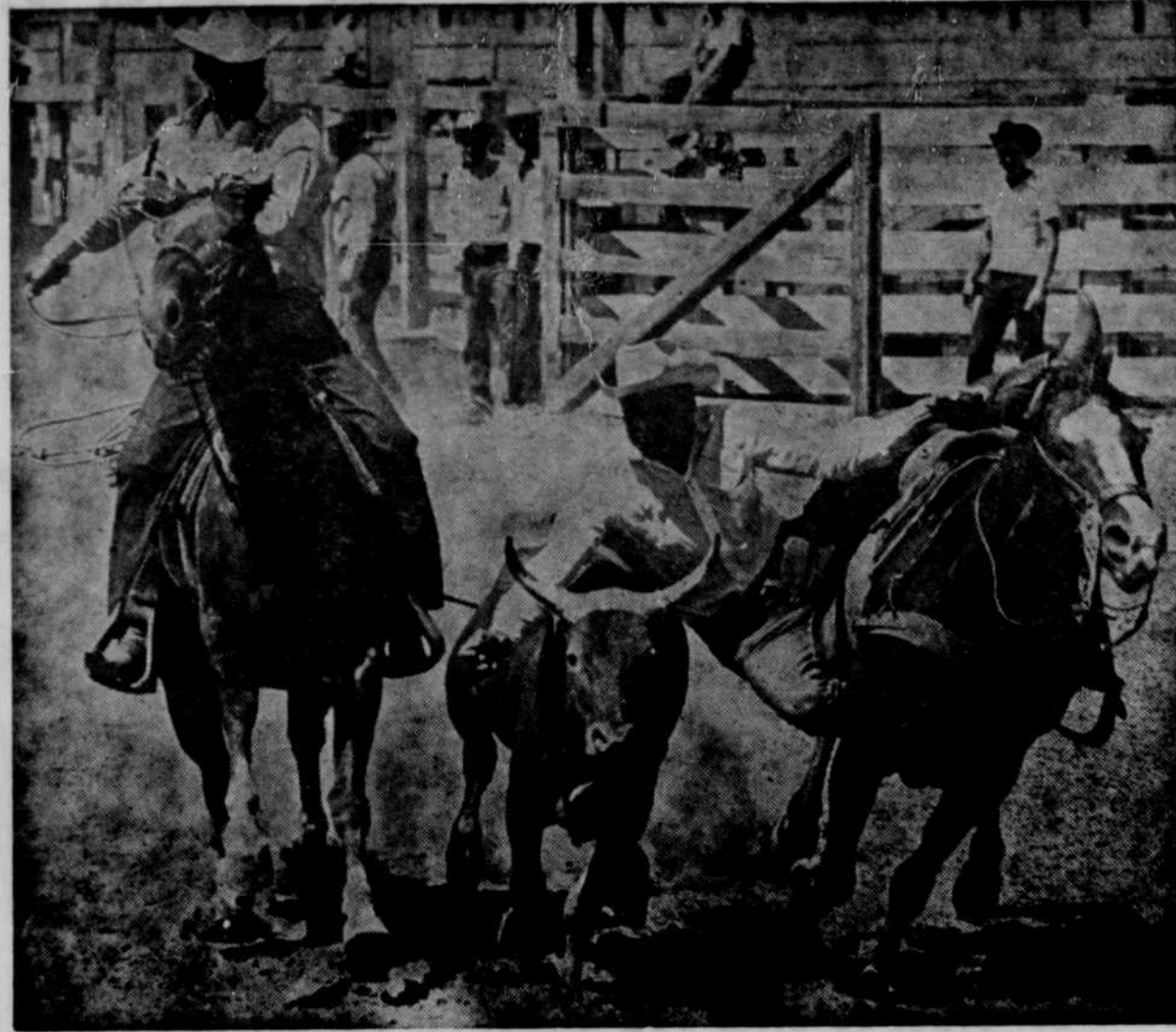
