DELOIT—Pink and white ceremonies appointed the altar of St. John's Catholic church at Deloit at 9:30 o'clock Saturday morning, June 14 when Miss Connie Lydon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Lydon of Ewing, became the bride of Ronald R. Park, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. F. Park of Page.

Rev. A. F. Hoising officiated at the nuptial mass and performed the double-ring ceremony. Bill Bauer and Gene Bollwitt served the mass.

Miss Bonnie Burival of O'Neill, soloist, sang "On This Day" as the bride placed her bouquet at the feet of the Blessed Mother. Other songs were "Ave Maria" and "Pani's Angelicus." Miss Carol Hoffman of Clearwater accompanied her.

The bride, escorted to the altar on the arm of her father, wore an original gown by Sylvia of white silk organza over taffeta fashioned on princess lines. Urges August Tests for Beginners

If you have a child whose fifth birthday comes after October 15 and before January 1 and you wish to have him take the test approved by the state board of education for entrance into kindergarten next year, make arrangements for such tests with the county superintendent soon.

This was urged this week by County Supt. Alice French. The testing will be done early in August, but arrangements must be made now. The examination will be administered by Doctor Clifton of the University of Nebraska, who has been certified by the state department. The requirements will continue to be a mental, physical, emotional and social age of at least 5 years 6 months which will make it difficult for a child to pass. A fee of \$5 plus a share of examiner's expenses will be charged.

No tests are given to five-year-old children to determine eligibility for entrance into the first grade. 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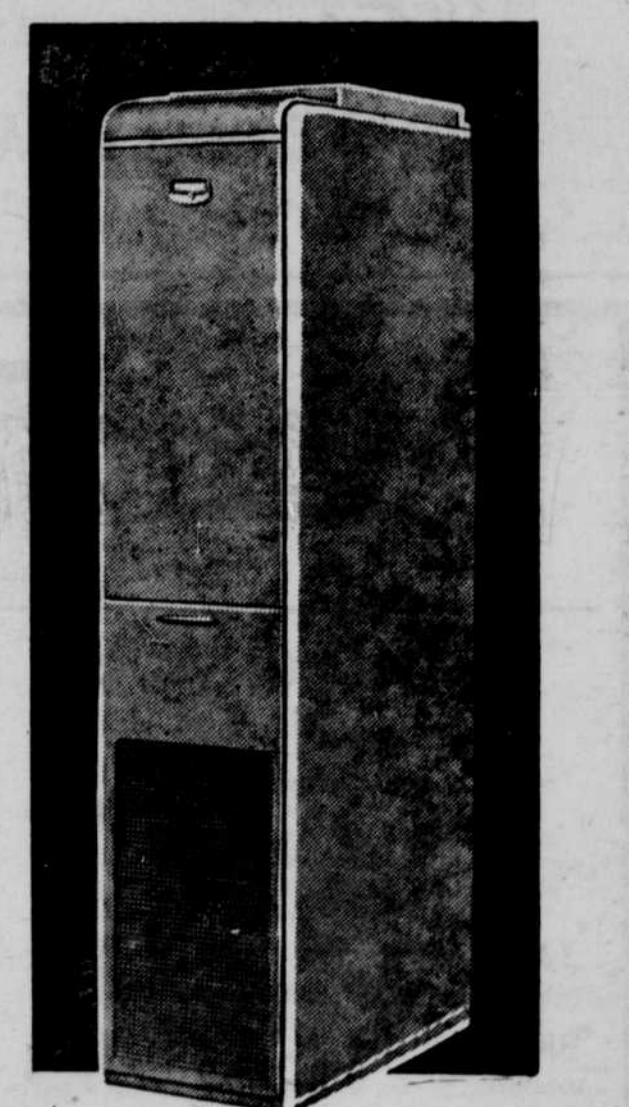
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
