

Golden Retains Crown in O'Neill Golf Meet

Maxwell Jeremiah Golden, 58, late Monday emerged as victor of the 37th annual O'Neill open golf tournament at the Country club here. It was the 11th time the grey-haired grandfather of 14 children had annexed.

The runnerup was Jim Snyder, 28, Ainsworth farm implement dealer and father of two children. Snyder has been golfing about six years and last year, in his initial entry in the O'Neill meet, he competed in the first flight.

At the end of the first nine holes in the title match, Golden owned a two-hole edge. Both bogged the 10th and Snyder birdied on long number 11 and narrowed Golden's margin to one.

On long number 17 Snyder had tree and rough trouble and Golden had his foe two up with one to go, and that ended the 1935 meet.

One hundred five golfers participated—a record number. Weather was ideal although there was a high northwest wind most of Monday. Entries came en masse from Bassett, Ainsworth, Neligh and Plainview. States represented included Wisconsin, Tennessee, Missouri, Texas, Minnesota and Iowa.

Golden is a hotel operator here. Trophies were presented to winners and runnersup in all flights and consolation flights.

At West O'Neill, Page won a loop game, 7-6.

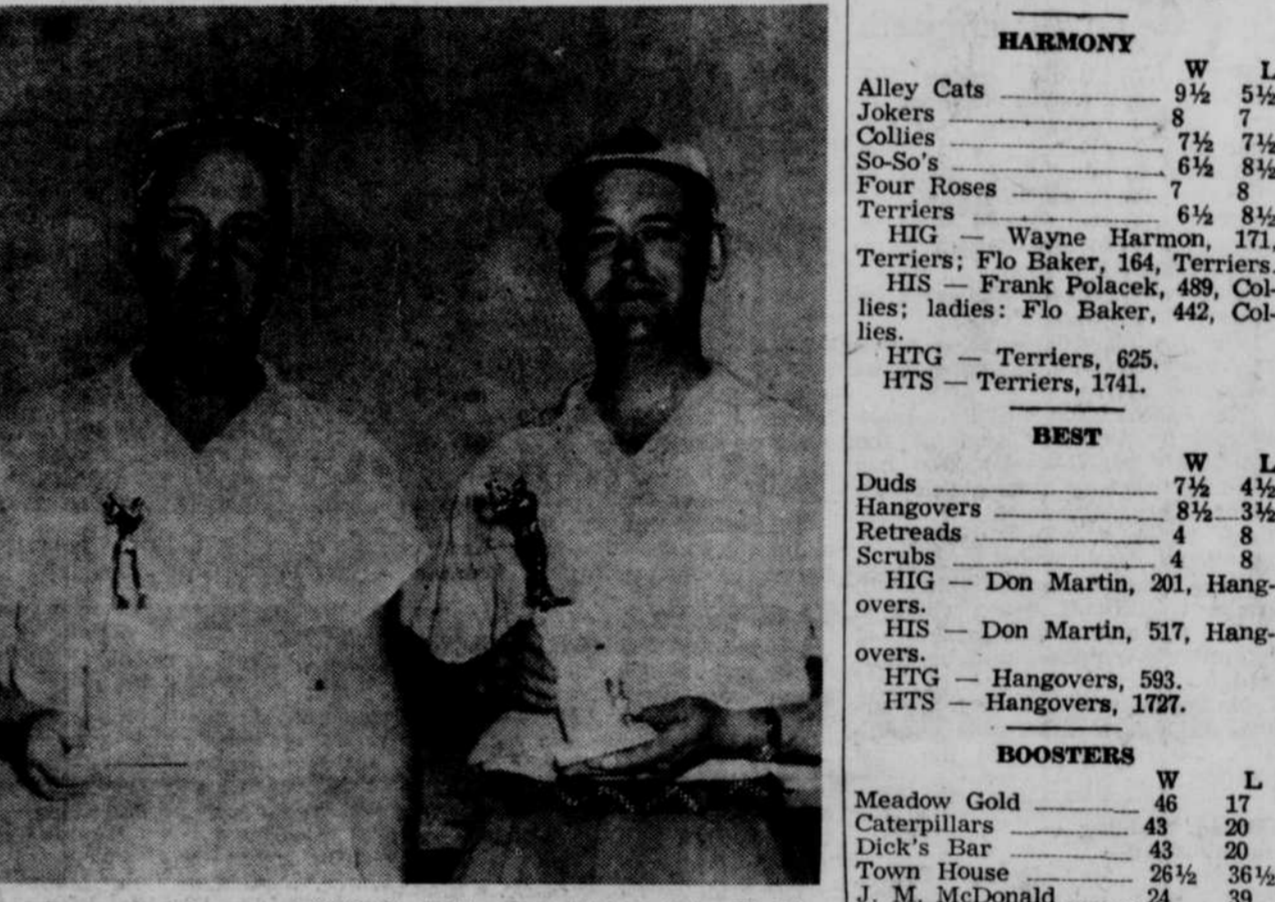
The East O'Neill entry will go to Stuart Friday evening.
