- jury to animals or articles on exhibition, but they will not be responsible for any damage that may occur.
11. Exhibitors and visitors will take notice that the society will not be liable for any damage or accident that may occur to anyone, or for the loss of property, but the officers will use diligence to avoid any accidents and afford protection.
 12. The association reserves the right to call off any or all of the program on account of bad weather, or any other unavoidable cause.
 13. Any article or animal on exhibition shall not be removed from the grounds until 4:00 p.m., of the last day of the Fair except special permission, or will forfeit any premium money won.
 14. No animal or article may compete for more than one premium except sweepstakes or specials.
 15. In cases where no person is competing, the judges will award first, second, or no premium, as they deem best.
 16. The manner of awarding premiums for best display will be by computing premiums and the one having the most will be declared the winner.
 17. Two red ribbons are equal to one blue ribbon.
 18. The age of the animal shall be counted from the last day of the month in which it was born.
 19. All stock must be owned by the exhibitor at least 30 days prior to date of entry.
 20. Any article or animal fraudulently entered or shown, that wins a premium, if satisfactory proof is shown the Board of Directors, the premium shall not be paid.
 21. All exhibits must be Holt county products.
 22. All 4-H club premiums will be paid in full. All other premiums will be paid in full unless by unavoidable cause, the receipts shall not be sufficient, in which case they will be prorated and paid accordingly.
 23. A blue ribbon denotes 1st premium; a red ribbon, 2nd premium, and a purple ribbon, sweepstakes. Superintendents will attach premium tags as soon as awards are made.
 24. All protests must be filed in writing with the Secretary during the Fair, and same will be acted upon at the first meeting of the Board of Directors.
 25. All animals must be exhibited at such time and place as the superintendent may direct.
 26. The annual meeting will be the first Saturday after the first day of November.

SUPERINTENDENTS

The Superintendents are required to take charge of all articles belonging to their department, on their arrival on the grounds and see that they are in the proper places.

Superintendents must be on the grounds early in the morning of each day of the Fair to assist exhibitors in ticketing and arranging the articles, and shall appoint the awarding committees in the respective classes under the direction and consent of the Board of Directors and report them at once and not later than Wednesday to the Secretary.

POLICE REGULATIONS

The President shall have charge of the grounds and it shall be his duty to assign the police force, provided by the Village of Chambers, their respective duties including gatekeepers. All persons employed shall be sworn conservators of the peace, and it shall be their duty to arrest any persons creating any disturbance or violating any rules of the Society.

Anyone entering the grounds clandestinely shall be arrested. No intoxicating drinks shall be sold or drunk on the grounds. Any person found intoxicated will be dealt with according to law.

Premium Money at State Fair Upped

LINCOLN—Premium money to be offered at the 1958 Nebraska state fair has been increased over the 1957 total to set another new record, according to a summary released this week.

Cash awards to be offered at this year's exposition amount to \$79,859 as compared with \$77,147 in 1957.

In addition, the fair will offer trophies and plaques valued at \$1,200; while Fair Board expenditures for ribbons will amount to \$1,800.

Increases in cash offerings have been effected in practically all of the major classes, according to Schultz.

Biggest single cash offering—\$14,493 including \$1,350 in special breed awards—is in the beef cattle class. Other large offerings include: 4-H Club \$12,425; dairy cattle \$10,796 including special awards; swine \$12,723 including specials; farm products \$9,937; sheep \$3,514; Future Farmers of America \$5,500.

Upright Silos May Be Used for High Moisture Corn

You can store high-moisture shelled corn in conventional upright silos without fear of spoilage.

However, moisture content at the time the corn is placed in storage must be above 25 percent, according to an article in the August issue of Successful Farming magazine.

The silo doors should be made as nearly airtight as possible—the use of a soft grease around the doors works well. A roof on the silo will keep out rain.

The same requirements for making and preserving silage apply to the storage of "wet" corn in an upright silo, says the magazine. The silo walls must be in good condition. They must be reinforced to withstand the pressures of shelled corn.

LAMB LOSSES

"Overeating disease," which has caused widespread losses among feeder lambs, now has been found in cattle, reports the August issue of Successful Farming magazine. The disease, known as enterotoxemia, usually results in sudden death. Symptoms resemble anthrax, blackleg, and other quick killers. Starting young animals early on grain feeding seems to help prevent it, the magazine says.
