#### LOT 5 - HOGS

Four - H members carrying market hogs or sow and litter projects are eligible to show in this lot. An animal can be shown only in one class in 4-H division.

29. Market hog - fat barrow or gilt, all breeds competing together.  
Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1; all others, 50c.

30. Market litter-6 or more gilts and barrows. All breeds competing together.  
Blue, \$10; Red, \$7.50; White, \$5; and all others, \$1.

31. Purebred litter - 6 or more boars and gilts.  
Blue, \$10; Red, \$7.50; White, \$5; all others \$1.

32. Purebred gilt born after January 1, 1957.  
Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1; all others, \$1.

33. Purebred boar born after January 1, 1957.  
Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1; all others, 50c.

All classes of breeding hogs to be shown by breeds with purple awards if show warrants.

#### LOT 6 - SHEEP

Only 4-H club members carrying sheep projects may compete.

34. Fat lambs, Blue, Red, White.  
Blue, Red, White

35. Breeding ewe lambs  
Blue, Red, White

36. Breeding buck lambs  
Blue, Red, White

Blue, \$3; Red, \$2; White, \$1. All others, 50c. Purple award if show warrants.

#### LOT 7 - SADDLE STOCK

Stock Horse under Saddle.  
Blue \$4; Red, \$3; White, \$2.

Any breed or size of light horse. Judged on 70% performance and manners, 20% conformation and 10% on appointments.

Halter Class—any breed or size of light horses 2-yrs. and under.  
Blue \$4; Red, \$3; White, \$2.

Show with halter or open face bridle. Judged on 80% conformation and 20% on grooming, training, and manners.

#### LOT 8 - POULTRY

Persons carrying poultry projects may exhibit a pair of birds (cockerel and pullet), and may show as many as 2 individuals (if 2 individuals are shown they must be one cockerel and one pullet). But not more than 4 birds may be shown by one exhibitor. Each exhibitor must furnish his own pen and feed. Each pair and each individual must be in separate pens.  
Blue, \$1.50; Red, \$1; White, 50c.

Only members of 4-H clubs are eligible to exhibit in the following classes. A member must exhibit in the project he or she is carrying, and the article must have been completed since the last fair. Members are urged to make entries early with Mrs. Glead. Entries may be made up until 6 p.m., Monday.
