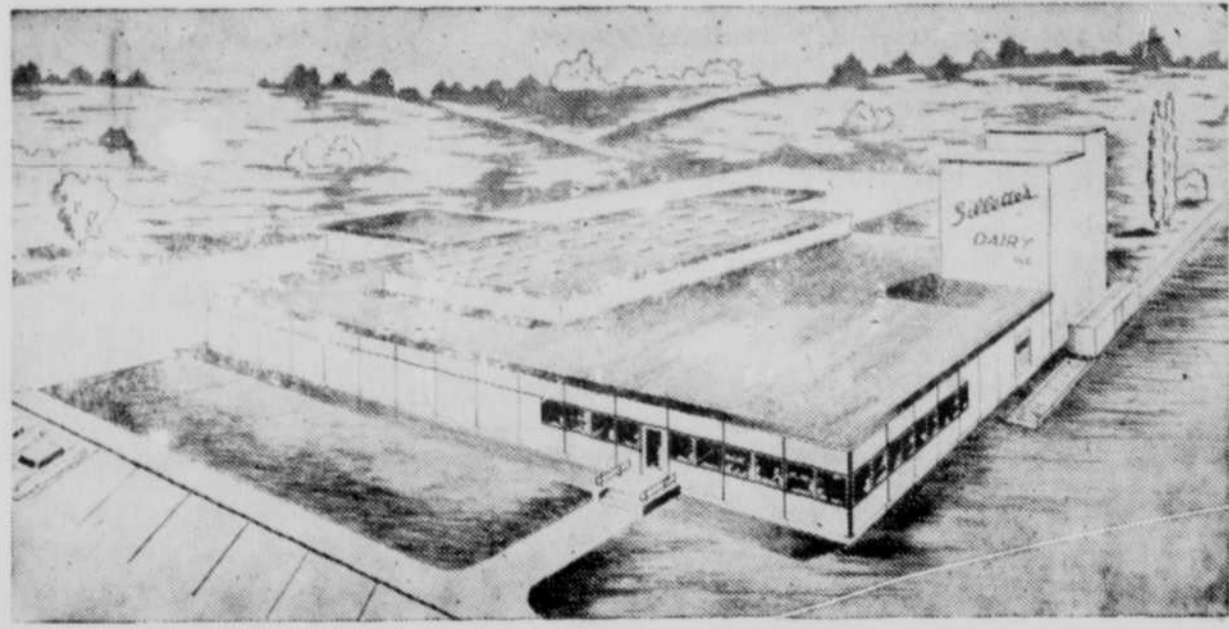

Gillette to Operate New Plant

Gillette Dairy, Inc., will have a new powdered milk plant in Norfolk to be erected on East Omaha Ave. Arrangements for the new building were made through the Norfolk Development corporation, Norfolk Chamber of Commerce industrial committee and Small Business administration in Washington, D. C. The project is intended to give the non-grade A milk producers in the area a con-

tinued market for their product after July 1, 1959, when LB 584, a measure enacted by the Nebraska legislature, goes into effect. The new law requires all fluid milk bottled to be grade A. Gillette will operate the powdered milk plant for the Norfolk Development corporation. Cost of the building (artist's sketch above) is \$188,782, according to Howard Strong & Associates, architects.

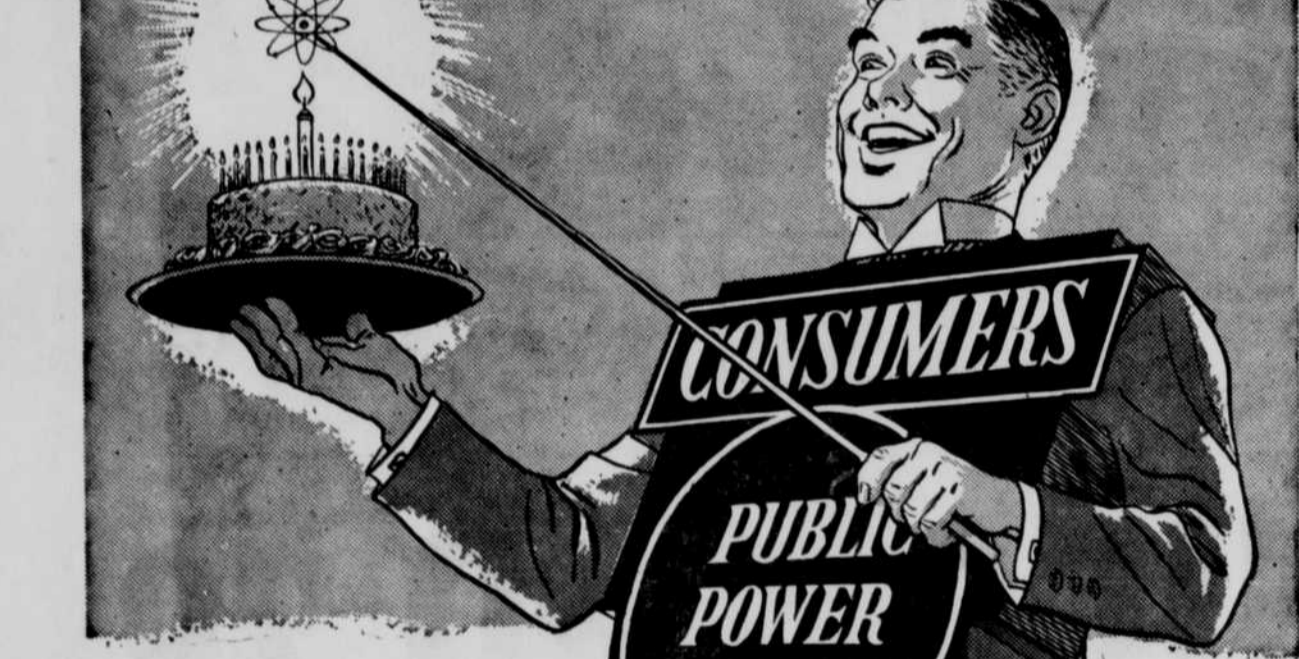
