Brunswick Kids Have Fun on Excursion

Burlington Puts on Special Coach

One hundred fourteen kids climbed from a sleek, air-conditioned Burlington passenger coach about 4:30 p.m. Thursday—many of them having had their first train ride.

The Brunswick Commercial club arranged with Burlington for the passenger coach to be attached to the westbound freight train 95 on the South Sioux City to O'Neill run.

It was a happy horde that boarded at Brunswick. They were bug-eyed youngsters of all ages. Chaperones were Estel Dwinell, Mrs. Alvin Johnson, Leroy Welles and Lynn Rose.

Also boarding for the junket were several O'Neill youngsters and adults.

The Burlington line has been almost an exclusive freight line for 20 years since the "galloping goose"—a semidiesel-electric—was taken out of service.

Some of the youngsters Thursday rode in the cab with the engineer, sharing time in shifts.

Lincoln "dead". Total fare collected for the stunt were taken compared to the expense. It was a public relations deal.

The youngsters were met at O'Neill by a school bus and a fleet of autos for the return trip. Before departure, however, there was a treat in store at the Merri Dr. Pepper Bottling company where thirsts were quenched with pop.

Eastbound train 96 is scheduled to leave O'Neill at 1 a.m. the next day following the O'Neill turnaround and that is why the return highway transportation was provided.

Other adults aboard for the kicks were Fred Holsclaw of O'Neill, a passenger, and Cal Stewart, who conducted interviews in the cab with train crewman and youngsters while the train in transit. Mrs. N. D. Ickes of Page, special correspondent for The Frontier, boarded at Orchard and left the train at Page.

Wayward Driver 'Fed Up' with Job

Mail Truck Is Found at Fremont

Donald Houderschildt, Omaha mail truck driver on the Omaha-Norfolk-O'Neill run, Friday reported to the Omaha postal inspector's office to explain that he became "fed up" with his job and abandoned a mail-filled truck at a Fremont parking lot.

Houderschildt was employed by John Uhlner, Omaha trucking line owner who holds one of the contracts for star route mail trucking — one of the substitute routes for Chicago & North Western trains 13 and 14. The trains quit running July 6 and multiple truck routes were established.

The Omaha driver left O'Neill on schedule at 2 p.m., Tuesday, August 5. He was to have picked up mail at intermediate points between O'Neill and Norfolk and was to have reached Omaha at 9:15 p.m. He failed to make intermediate pickups and parked his 33-ft. trailer outfit near a Fremont filling station.

The abandoned truck with mail unmolesed was found Wednesday night, August 6.

The extraordinary situation was reported in last week's issue of The Frontier—hours before any other news agencies had the story.

Postal Inspector T. R. Morrell of Omaha said the mail was recovered and dispatched. Mail at some of the intermediate points was held over until the next day.

Houderschildt was reported to have telephoned his wife Wednesday night, saying his brakes were defective. Inspection of the truck, Morrell said, did not disclose such a defect.

The wayward driver incident was one of a series of news-worthy events since the truck fleet took over to replace the train.

Two weeks earlier an O'Neill-bound truck hit a bridge near Clearwater. The postmaster at Clearwater went to the wreckage near the banks of the stream and claimed Clearwater mail. Mail for other points was distributed by a substitute truck brought into action by John Turner, O'Neill contractor.

Contracts for hauling the mail were to have been let July 21 but the postal transportation officers at Omaha decided more capacity was needed than provided in original plans. New bids were sought and temporary contractors continued to make the runs.

Saturday, August 9, the mail into Norfolk and O'Neill was over five hours late due to a truck breakdown at Fremont. Points served out of the secondary Norfolk and O'Neill terminals correspondingly were late in getting mail.

Houderschildt had given his address as 2518 Capitol ave., Omaha, but Mrs. Thomas B. Tierney of that address promptly announced Houderschildt had never lived at that address.
