Big Mike's Scamper Breaks Bassett

Turns Bad Situation into Clincher

Big Mike Spitzberger turned what looked like a second defeat for the season for Coach Marvin Miller's O'Neill high Eagles into an upset victory Friday night on Tiger turf.

Mike hooked a Bassett fumble on O'Neill's nine-yard line and raced 91 yards to pay dirt.

At that stage the Blues led 12-7, but before Mike's starting run, Bassett was enjoying a first down with goal to go. A Bassett touchdown at that point midway in the fourth period could have marked a callant uphill fight for the Tigers, who trailed 12-0 at halftime.

Led by Ronnie Smith, Jim Larson, Spitzberger and Robert (Butch) Wheeler, the Millerites put on a show in the first 20 minutes that gave both sides of the field plenty to talk about.

The Eagles, playing heads up brand of ball that just wasn't expected took the whole loop by surprise. The team spirit, the running, blocking and tackling shown by the Eagles is something that even the most optimistic fans didn't expect.

O'Neill opened the scoring in the second period when Bill Eby crashed over the double stripes from three yards out. A pass for the extra point fell incomplete.

Bassett, hurt by penalties throughout the first half, had trouble getting a move going that could penetrate the Eagle defense. After a fumble the Blues started on the move again and Jim Larson found the promised land this time. After a key block by Ronnie Smith, Larson went into the end zone from 17 yards out. The conversion was halted one yard short.

Bassett looked like a new team the second half as the Tigers roared out and marched right down the field to come within five points of the surprising Eagles. The extra point was good. O'Neill fumbled and the Tigers once again took over.

After a series of line plunges, the pigskin lay first down and just nine yards away from touchdown territory. This set the stage for Big Mike's breathtaking gallop. The 157-pound tackle grabbed the oval after a vicious tackle by Wheeler squirmed it loose from the Tiger quarterback. Mike hurried untouched for the clinching tally. Smith ran the ball over for the extra point and that was the ball game, 19-7.

Wheeler played tremendous ball for O'Neill, accounting for a big percentage of the tackles.

Cornhuskers Surprise Penn State, 14-7

The University of Nebraska Cornhuskers, loaded with sophomores and other inexperienced hands, Saturday upset the 14-point favorite Nittany Lions of Penn State, 14-7, at Memorial stadium in Lincoln.

Pat Fisher, a sophomore back and youngest in a series of Fisher family athletes originating at St. Edward, streaked 95 yards for the touchdown that broke the back of the Lions.

Nebraska will play Purdue of the Big Ten conference Saturday at Lafayette, Ind.

Pilger's third TD came as the game ended. Strudoff marked up 137 rushing yards against the Tigers.

Verdigre Hawks No Match for SMA

Card Nubbins Press for Late TD

It was virtually no contest Friday afternoon for the St. Mary's academy Cardinals as they walloped the Verdigre Blackhawks, 47-0, on the Verdigre grid in a Niobrara Valley conference encounter.

SMA chalked up 13 points in the first period, 14 points in each of the second and third stanzas, and added six in the finale.

Ron Clark bounced two yards for the first TD to climax a 43-yard drive in seven plays. The drive was put together on the heels of the opening kickoff.

On the last play of the first period, Quarterback Bill Craig scampered 30 yards to score and added the extra point.

The third TD was set up after Lambert Belina blocked a Hawk punt on the two. Gene Schneider bowled over and also added the point. This made the count 20-0.

Larry Tomlinson scooped up a fumble and sped 27 yards for pay dirt with 10 seconds remaining in the first half. Gayle Stevens added the point.

Schneider got back in the scoring by skirting end behind excellent blocking and rambling 10 yards. Schneider added the point. At this juncture the scoreboard read: St. Mary's 34, Verdigre 0. Reserves were in the game in the fourth when SMA put together a 30-yard drive that saw Larry Wanser hopping across from the five. Jim Shoemaker was credited with the PAT.

The final TD resulted after Terry Hynes recovered a Hawk fumble on the eight. Stevens went over on the next play.

Offensive line play of Gene Turner and Paul Ziska sparkled up front. Defensive work of Keith McKim looked good. McKim has been a cog in the SMA machine in the first two games of the season—both wins. In the opener the Cards smacked Dwight Assumption at Dwight.

SMA's third unit drove deep into Verdigre territory but time ran out before the nubbins could score. Frosh Ray Belina covered 30 yards in four tries to lead all Cardinal ball carriers with a 7.5 average.

SMA racked up 10 first downs; Verdigre, none. The parochial eight-manners built up 209 yards rushing compared to a 14-yard deficit for Verdigre.

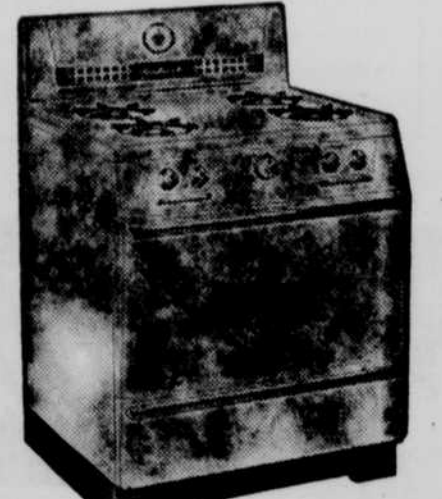

NVC Showdown May Come Friday Night

SMA Hosts Wildcats; Eagles to Burwell

A showdown may come early in the Niobrara Valley conference Friday night when the Butte Wildcats come to town fresh from last week's 27-0 victory over the Spencer Eagles. Meanwhile the Wildcats' Friday night foe—the St. Mary's Cardinals—bowed over the Verdigre Hawks, 47-0, at Verdigre.

Coach Larry Turner of Butte has five regulars returning from last season's club which pressed SMA, 20-6. Butte will enjoy a weight advantage in the line of nine pounds per man in the first string.

Butte whipped Naper, 45-6, in the season's opener while SMA was playing Dwight Assumption outside the circuit.

Butte backfield stars are Bob Kyriess and Jerry Roether. Defensively Butte sports Rich Abbenhaus, a 260-pound center.

If Coach Don Templemeyer's kids can survive Butte they are in reasonable position to go the route. If they win the title again they will gain permanent possession of the league's traveling trophy. SMA shared the crown in 1936 and won it in 1937.

Bill Craig, brilliant SMA quarterback, will be shelved this week because of injuries. It will be SMA's first test against a heavier and faster opponent. SMA, however, has considerably more depth than Butte or any other team in the league.

Coach Marv Miller will haul his O'Neill high Eagles to Burwell Friday night to tackle the Longhorns, who will be fielding exactly the same team as a year ago.

In 1937 O'Neill dumped Burwell, 20-6, and it was one of two victories for the season.

Burwell has fashioned two narrow victories this season over credible opposition. The Longhorns downed Gibbon, 7-6, and Loup City, 7-6.

Ray Magsman, former University of Nebraska griddler, is Burwell coach. Devey Urbauer raced 47 yards for Burwell's TD against Gibbon.

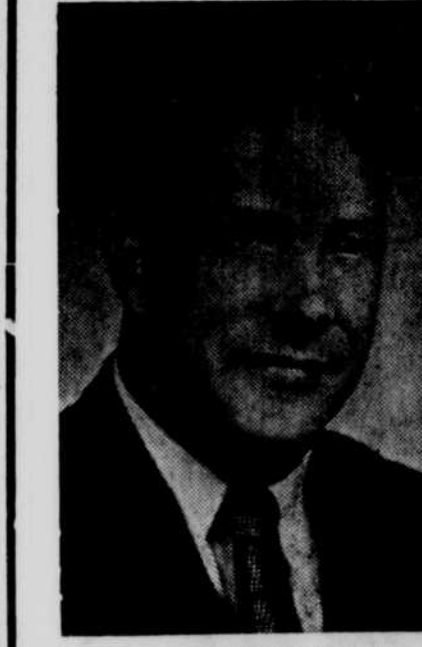
