Miller Adds Voice to Hiway Postoffice

Summerfield Directs Investigation

Rep. A. L. Miller (Nebr.-R) adds his support to a position taken last week by Rep. Glenn Cunningham (Nebr.-R) relating to highway postal service between Omaha and points in northeast, northcentral and northwestern Nebraska.

Cunningham last week called the interlocking star truck lines a "crazy-quilt" arrangement as a substitute for the last Chicago & North Western passenger-mail-express trains which quit the Omaha-Chadron run in July. The Omaha congressman, in the congressional record, urged a highway postoffice route to be established between Omaha and O'Neill.

Highway PO's carry mail clerks who function like railway postal mail clerks, breaking down and facilitating mail deliveries in transit. Trucks now plying each way between Omaha, Norfolk, O'Neill, Valentine, Theftord, Wilcox and Valentine haul "dead" mail that is worked at strategic points—Valentine, O'Neill and Norfolk.

In a telegram to The Frontier Wednesday, Miller said Postmaster-General Summerfield has directed Frank Barr to direct a regional director of the postoffice department, to contact officials in cities and towns between Omaha and Chadron relative to establishing highway service between those two points. A month ago John A. Berkebile, Barr's assistant, visited O'Neill and made a first-hand report to Barr some recommended changes.

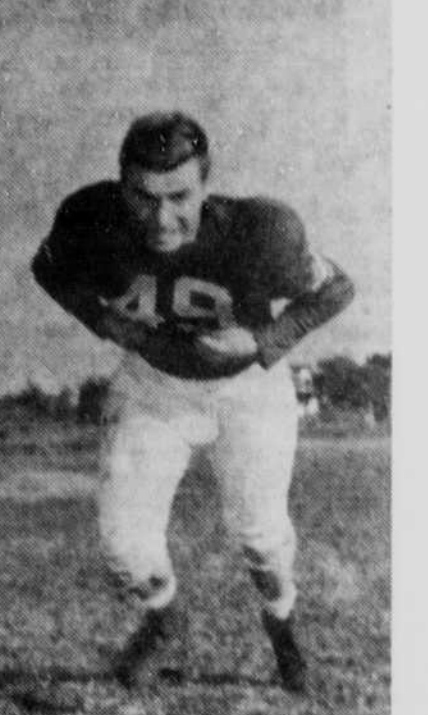
