

Waterfowl, Grouse Hunting Started Sandhills Teeming with Ducks

Waterfowl and grouse hunting seasons began in Nebraska Wednesday and indications are that numbers are in for a good time. The pheasant and quail seasons open October 25. Nebraska's duck season will run to December 29. Grouse hunting will end October 12. Goose shooters began blasting away Wednesday. The season on Canada and white-fronted geese lasts until November 29 and on blue and snow geese until December 14. The state game commission said the state's prime waterfowl areas—sand hills, rain-water basin and central and western Nebraska—are teeming with ducks. A good crop was produced locally and early migrants already are showing up. The commission described prospects for prairie chicken and sharp-tailed grouse as outstanding. Gordon Heebner, grouse specialist for the game commission, said a census of breeding population of grouse in the sand hills indicated a 110 percent increase over 1935. The bag limit on grouse is two and possession limit is four. Duck hunters may take a daily bag limit of four and possession limit of eight. The daily bag may not include more than two canvasbacks, or two redheads, or one canvasback and one redhead. The possession limit may not include more than four canvasbacks, or four redheads, or four in the aggregate of both canvasbacks and redheads. The bag and possession limits on geese are five and five respectively. They may not include more than two Canada geese or its subspecies, or one white-fronted goose, or one Canada goose or its subspecies and one white-fronted goose. Residents 16 and older must have resident hunting permits. To hunt waterfowl, they also need two-dollar duck stamps. All non-residents regardless of age must have non-resident permits to hunt in Nebraska. Waterfowl hunting begins a half-hour before sunrise and ends at sunset.

Security Note to Those Over 72

All persons drawing social security payments who have earned or expect to earn over \$1,200 in 1936 should have their benefit payments stopped if they were under 72 years of age during any month of the year, according to Clifford Kittelson, manager of the Norfolk social security office. When a beneficiary under age 72 earns in excess of \$1,200 in a calendar year and fails to submit a report of these excessive earnings until the end of the year, it is necessary for him to repay all or at least part of the benefit payments he received during the year.
