

Dial Phone System Nearly Completed

CLEARWATER — The Transition from manual operation of telephones to the dial system is virtually completed here. Only a few of the long distance calls are now being handled by an operator.

About 45 subscribers in the so-called Deloit area will not be hooked up to dials until late this week.

The Clearwater Telephone company will be out of business when the transition is completed. Owner of the new system is the Northeast Nebraska Telephone company.

The Clearwater prefix is HUNTER. The exchange is expected to serve five hundred patrons in about 10 years.

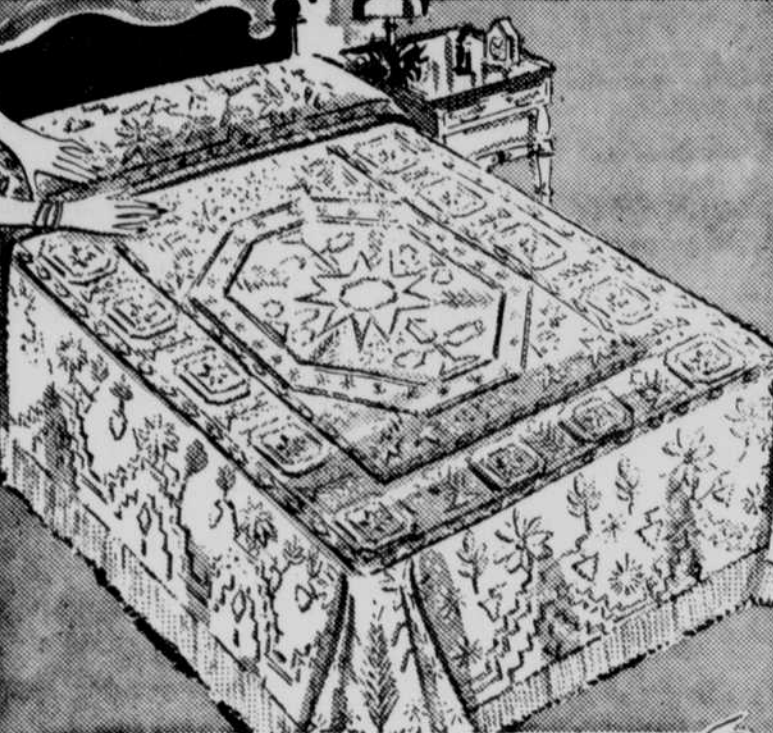

The Custer theater is regarded as one of the best summer stock theaters in the Midwest, beginning 13 years ago as a touring professional group. Today it is sponsored by the University of South Dakota.

There were 55 people at the camp including six faculty members and 32 students. Seating capacity at the theater is 350.

Each play usually runs about two weeks. Jim appeared in the musical "Brigadoon" and directed "Fumed Oak" by Noel Coward. He also appeared in "The Legend of Devil's Gulch" and the passion play at nearby Spearfish.

In two years at K-State, Jim has aided in 12 stage productions. He received his early forensic training at O'Neill high school where he was graduated in 1956.

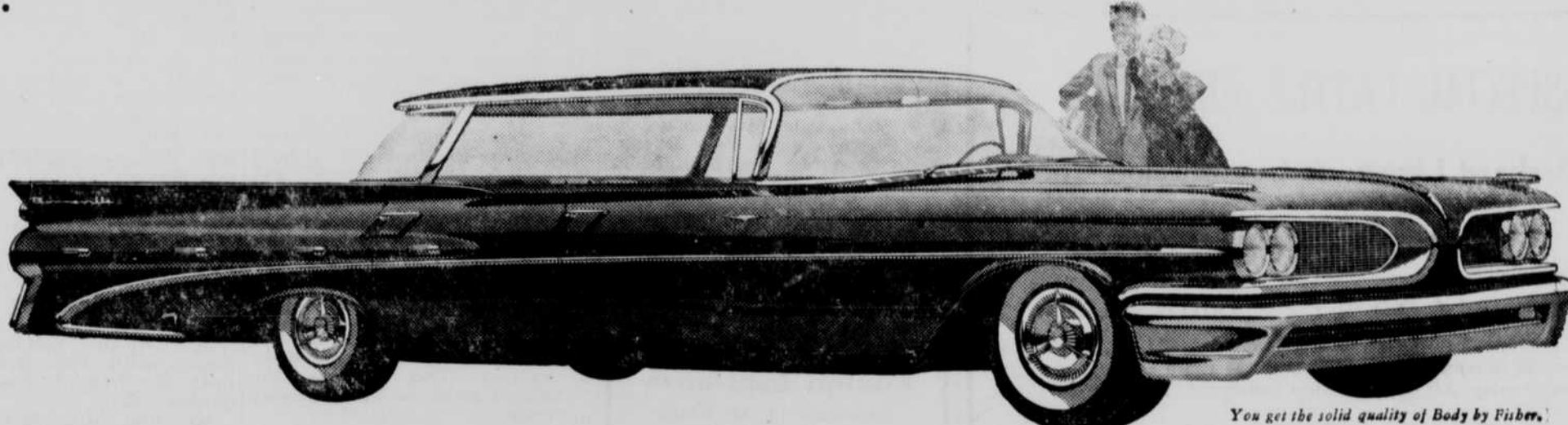
