The proposed amendment requires public corporations which are organized to provide electricity to continue to make the same payments in lieu of taxes as they did in 1957. It further permits the legislature to require additional payments to incorporated cities and villages, school districts, counties, and the state, but not to exceed a total of 5% (including present payments) of the gross retail electric revenue of the public corporation in cities and villages.
