### Pollution Tests Made from Elkhorn

#### Atkinson, O'Neill and Ewing Dumping

A state health department scientist who has been testing Elkhorn river waters said Friday sandhills residents have a habit of using the river as a dump ground. Allan Johnson, who specializes in the study of inland waters, told the state water pollution control council that residents customarily back trucks to the river bank and dump in tin cans, carcasses of dead animals and any other trash of which they want riddance. Laws governing operation of dump grounds may have to be strengthened, some council members suggested.

T. A. Filipi, health department sanitation chief, noted that all required now for creation of a dump ground is permission of the landowner. He noted that while dumping directly into a stream can be curbed, there might be question as to the legality or illegality of dumping along banks near a stream. Johnson delivered to the council a preliminary technical report of tests on water taken at 153 sampling points on the Elkhorn river and its tributaries during August and September. Johnson said tests indicate Fremont to be a "flagrant" polluter of the stream. Atkinson dumps into the Elkhorn. O'Neill's disposal capacity was increased about 10 years ago with a sewer-lift installation. Last week Johnson was taking samples at Neligh. Officials at Neligh have been told a 71-thousand-dollar disposal system would be needed to care for the needs of that city. The tests indicate pollution also at such points as O'Neill, Norfolk, Battle Creek and Meadow Grove, he said. But he noted that Norfolk is building a sewage disposal plant. He said Ewing, although it has a plant, does not operate it. O'Neill, upstream, already is polluting the river. In a progress report on sewage treatment plants currently under construction, Filipi said plants at Hastings, Shelton, Juniata, Cortland, Utica, Clark and Elmwood are completed. Percentage of completion of other plants: Norfolk, 40; Fairbury, 20; Ogallala, 20; Ina, 25; start awaited; Holdrege, 25; Unadilla, completed by end of October; Lexington, a good start; Omaha southwest plant, 50 per cent; Clay Center, bids received last week; Blair, 50; Kimball, 25; Arapahoe, just getting started; Plainview, plans and specifications drawn; North Loup, advertising for bids; Wilber, plans and specifications being drawn; Hallam, plans and specifications being drawn; Elkhorn, plans being reviewed; Seward, plans due soon.
