Ballot Measure to Be Discussed

A leading topic of discussion at Monday's November meeting of the Chamber of Commerce, to be held at 7 p.m. at the M & M cafe, will be proposed amendment number 7 which will be voted on the following day by Nebraska electors.

The measure on the ballot, proposed by the legislature, would authorize the state legislature to permit municipal corporations to acquire and own real and personal property to be leased to private enterprises and to issue revenue bonds to defray the cost thereof.

The measure is considered a device to enable municipalities to induce new industries to locate in cities and towns.
