S-T-A Asks Reversal on Douglas Ruling

The Save-the-Trains association asked the state supreme court Thursday in Lincoln to reverse the Douglas county district court which dismissed the association's petition seeking an order to force the Chicago and North Western railway to put trains 13 and 14 back into operation between Omaha and Chadron.

In a brief filed with the high court

the association said the district court erred in sustaining the railway's motion for dismissal of the petition on grounds the lower court lacked jurisdiction over the matter.

The district court case involved the association's request

that the railroad be ordered to put the trains back into operation until the company had received a supreme court mandate allowing it to withdraw the two trains.

The company withdrew the last two passenger trains

shortly after the supreme court had reversed a state railway commission order denying discontinuance of the train service.
