- teaspoon nutmeg 1/8 teaspoon allspice
- 2 teaspoon vanilla egg whites, beaten stiff
- pint vanilla ice cream, softened Mr. ½ cup graham cracker crumbs

Gradually beat sugar into egg yolks. Add pumpkin, milk, brown sugar, salt, spices and vanilla; mix well. Cook in top of double boiler over hot water until slightly thickened, stirring occasionally.
