## Thanksgiving Dessert Can Be Prepared in Advance

Want a good Thanksgiving dessert which can be prepared ahead of time? Try this Pumpkin Ice Cream Pie that Bill Perry, supervisor of the local Meadow Gold plant sent to us. It goes into the freezer until firm and needn't come out until you're ready to slice it.

Meadow Gold's vanilla ice cream and beaten egg whites are folded into a spicy pumpkin filling for creaminess, according to Beatrice Cooke, director of the test kitchens in Chicago where the recipe was developed. It requires no baking, for a graham cracker crust is used.

## PUMPKIN ICE CREAM PIE (Six servings)

1 9-inch graham cracker crust, chilled  
2 egg yolks, slightly beaten  
1/2 cup granulated sugar  
1 cup canned pumpkin  
2/3 cup homogenized milk  
1/4 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/8 teaspoon allspice  
1/2 teaspoon vanilla  
2 egg whites, beaten stiff  
1/2 pint vanilla ice cream, softened  
1/2 cup graham cracker crumbs

Gradually beat sugar into egg yolks. Add pumpkin, milk, brown sugar, salt, spices and vanilla; mix well. Cook in top of double boiler over hot water until slightly thickened, stirring occasionally. Cool. Fold in egg whites and ice cream. Pour into crumb crust; sprinkle cracker crumbs on top. Freeze until firm. 29c adv
