Tomlinson and Schneider Land All-State Berths

End Larry Tomlinson and Back Gene Schneider of the all-victorious St. Mary's academy 1958 football team landed first term berths on the Lincoln Journal-Star mythical all-state eight-man grid teams announced Sunday.

Other selections: Ron Reiners of Red Willow, end; Gary Hartman of Rising City and Don Ostdiek of Lawrence, guards; Gary Herbloom of Shelby, center; Daryl Pearson of Ceresco and Lyle Marquis of Rising City, backs.

Honorable mention went to Bill Craig of St. Mary's, back. Said the Lincoln papers of the choices: "Tomlinson, St. Mary's prize flanker, won praise from friend and foe alike for his excellent offensive and defensive play. He hauled in 26 passes for 589 yards and 13 touchdowns, then ran for a pair of scores and chipped in with four extra points. That, in addition to his defensive play, makes Tomlinson a standout in any brand of football. He stands 6-1 and weighs 196 pounds.

"Schneider tallied 111 points this year and averaged 12 yards a rush. "This is the finest collection of eight-man football players in Nebraska history. Large certificates suitable for framing will be presented."

Only other area man to receive recognition in the Journal-Star all-star selections were these Class B 11-man choices: Frank Schamp of Ord, end; Jim Arndt of Pierce, guard; Bob Vodehnal of Burwell, center.

No six-man honors were accorded in the area.

Cards Picked for State Honors

The Lincoln Star sports department last Thursday became the second metropolitan newspaper to place the St. Mary's academy Cardinals at the top of Nebraska's heap of eight-man grid teams.

The mythical state honors also were awarded the 1958 Scarlet by the Omaha World-Herald (as reported in last week's issue of The Frontier).

Wrote Al Beebe of The Star staff: "O'Neill St. Mary's rode to the top of the eight-man football lists in the final Star ratings off its 53-0 shellacking of previously top-rated Lawrence last week.

"No other contender can claim such an impressive victory over an opponent known to be as good as Lawrence. Nor can any team boast the tremendous offensive-defensive spread of Don Templemeyer's club.

"Racing through nine victories, St. Mary's racked up 463 points for a 51.4 average, while holding opponents to a total of only 12 points. Only Butte and Naper scored on St. Mary's.

"Lawrence dropped to fourth in the final list behind challengers Ceresco and Red Willow. Beaver Crossing gained seventh and Milford fell to ninth off Beaver Crossing's 40-14 victory over Milford.

"Other top contenders included Beatrice St. Joseph, Mullen, and Elba and several others were close.

"O'Neill St. Mary's is one of the largest schools playing eight-man ball. Templemeyer is switching to 11-man next year. End Larry Tomlinson and Back Gene Schneider paced a powerful, veteran club."
