

Regulation Follows Federal Subsidies'

Verdigré Man Speaks at NSIA Meet

One hundred twenty-one persons Saturday attended a 20-county meeting of the Nebraska School Improvement association at Norfolk. All counties were represented.

Particular attention was given four things:

Higher teacher certification, ve to power over reorganization plans by the state reorganization committee, federal and state financing of schools, and the type of organization necessary to effectively combat this type of legislation.

Frank Pierce, director, director, spoke on the dangers of Nebraska participating in federal aid to education. "The state of Nebraska," he said, "has demonstrated no financial incapacity to raise the funds necessary for school construction and operational costs of our school."

"Federal subsidies must naturally be followed by supervision or regulation and controls. If, therefore, becomes necessary for the state of Nebraska to refrain from participating or entering into any additional federal programs."

Lloyd Waldo Chambers, former president of the association, said "the small schools such as our rural schools and the small community high schools will lose their rights of continuation of operation if proposed legislation is enacted."

S. H. Brauer, Jr., of Stuart, field representative, stated it is the association's belief that "some school district reorganization is advisable as time advances, but no changes should be effected by compulsion through laws or intimidation by our civil authorities."

"Our rural schools should be continued and improved, and essential control of the standards, directions and financing of schools should remain within the local school districts and in the hands of the local school boards," Brauer asserted. "The physical size and boundaries of a school district should be matters of local determination, not arbitrarily subject to a state central authority, nor pupil attendance or availability be a determining factor in school district reorganization."

Benton Marshall of Crawford, association president, stated: "We have a goal of one-hundred-thousand members and if such membership is obtained we can expect to accomplish much. In a short period of time we have the tremendous task of obtaining a membership within the counties that could hope to be effectual in containing the power and influence of our state department of education."

Clyde Widman of Amelia, association vice-president, said he "can see a great deal of awareness shown over the state by grassroots people who are not going to stand idly by while the existing school district pattern in the state is disrupted and destroyed."

1/2 teaspoon seasoning salt
