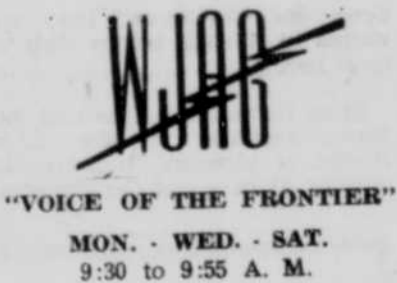
Gordon Fox will arrive home from the University of Nebraska Friday, December 19, to spend the holidays with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles Fox.
