Prices generally were steady on all classes with steer calves selling from \$34.75 to \$39.00 cwt. with heifer calves selling in a range from \$29.00 to \$34.50 cwt. Demand was particularly on the lighter weight kinds. Yearling steers in light supply but eligible to sell from \$26.50 to \$31.00; heifers \$24.50 to \$27.75 cwt. Butcher cattle sold on the stronger side with canners at \$14.00 to \$15.50, cutters \$15.75 to \$16.75. Best beef cows \$17.00 to \$19.00, the latter price paid for younger cornfield kinds at the top end of the beef cows. Butcher bulls \$19.75 to \$21.75—Butcher hogs topped at \$17.40, sows \$12.50 to 14.75, feeder pigs \$12.00 to \$15.00 per head.
