Weight. Diamonds are weighed in "Carats" and "Points". There are 100 points to the carat. A reliable jeweler will give you the exact weight of any stone he offers you. As between two diamonds of the same color, clarity and cutting workmanship, the larger will be worth more per carat than the smaller; the reason is that the larger sizes are rarer. More than 20 tons of rock, sand and gravel is dug and processed to recover diamonds that will produce, regardless of the size of the individual stones, a total of one carat of finished gems. But to find a piece of rough large enough to be polished into single one-carat gem, more than 250 tons must be mined.
