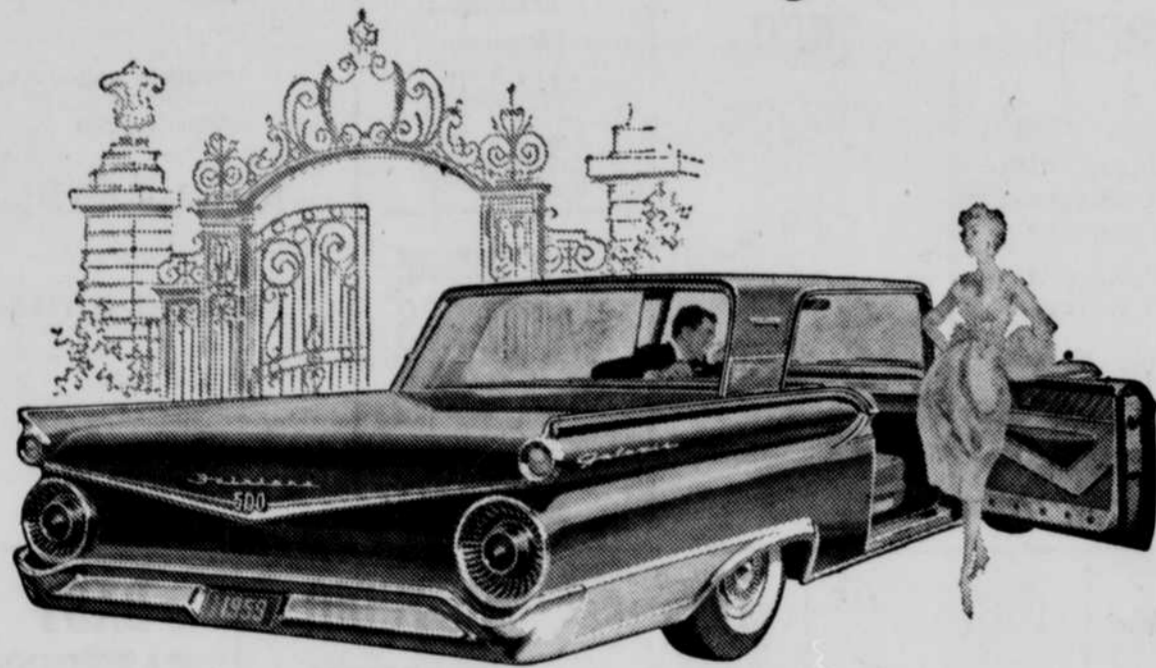

Brussels Sprouts Deluxe — Try This:

With fresh Brussels sprouts at their most succulent best right now, it's time to remember this popular member of the cabbage family for Sunday dinners.

Plain butter and seasonings are the usual seasoners, of course. Sprouts become company fare however, when dressed with a combination of butter and blue cheese according to Bill Perry, supervisor of the local Meadow Gold plant.

The simple recipe was devised by Beatrice Cooke, director of the Meadow Gold test kitchens in Chicago for those occasions when you want something really special in the vegetable category.

BRUSSELS SPROUTS DELUXE (Six Servings)
2 quarts fresh Brussels sprouts or 2 10-ounce frozen packages, unthawed
1/4 cup butter
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon basil
1/4 cup crumbled blue cheese
1/4 teaspoon fresh ground pepper.

Trim Brussels sprouts. Cover and let stand in ice water for 15 minutes; drain. Melt butter in saucepan; add sprouts, salt and basil. Cover; cook over low heat until tender. Add blue cheese and pepper. Heat until cheese just melts.

THE DIAMOND

Weight. Diamonds are weighed in "Carats" and "Points". There are 100 points to the carat. A reliable jeweler will give you the exact weight of any stone he offers you. As between two diamonds of the same color, clarity and cutting workmanship, the larger will be worth more per carat than the smaller; the reason is that the larger sizes are rarer. More than 20 tons of rock, sand and gravel is dug and processed to recover diamonds that will produce, regardless of the size of the individual stones, a total of one carat of finished gems. But to find a piece of rough large enough to be polished into single one-carat gem, more than 250 tons must be mined.
