

Pofahls, Claussen Advance to Midwest

O'Neill Gloves Team Winner

NORFOLK — The three Pofahl brothers scored easy victories Wednesday night, January 28, before 1,196 paid at the Northeast Nebraska Golden Gloves Tournament.

Dean Pofahl scored the most impressive win, earning a lightweight semifinal decision over Norfolk's Johnny Lawler in a battle of former Midwest Golden Gloves kings. Lawler won the 1957 Midwest at 135 pounds, Pofahl at 147.

The other Pofahls advancing to the Midwest were Butch, who won the featherweight title, and Roger, who grabbed middleweight laurels. All were fighting for O'Neill, which won team honors with 24 points to 17 for South Sioux City and 11 for Wayne.

Charles Mahoney of O'Neill won the most promising fighter award, Robert Liebig, Platte Center, was honored as the best sportsman.
