Mrs. Milo Landreth of Page has been named by Nebraska Heart Fund Chairman Stanley Huffman of Ewing to serve as the 1939 Holt county heart fund chairman.

The 1939 Heart Fund Drive, which is being conducted during this month, advances the activity of the Nebraska Heart Association in combating heart and blood vessel disease which during the last year has caused 54% of Nebraska's deaths.

Mrs. Roy Shelhamer is the O'Neill chairman.

"Heart fund chairmanship carries with it heavy responsibility," Huffman said. "I am sure, however, that every county will advance beyond records set in 1938."

Mrs. Milo Landreth, Holt county chairman and Stanley Huffman, Nebraska Heart Fund chairman urge all residents interested in working on the 1939 Heart Fund Drive to contact the Holt county chairman as soon as possible.

"At least three-fourths of all funds collected will remain in Nebraska," Huffman added, "with over half slated to again be allocated to research."

Huffman concluded by stating that next year's drive should put the total Nebraska contributions over the one million mark in 1939.
