Chocolate Milk Makes Tasty Chocolate Crunch

Here's a dessert every chocolate fancier in the family will enjoy from father down to the youngsters. Sent to us by Bill Perry, supervisor of the local Meadow Gold branch, it is for Chocolate Crunch made with chocolate milk. The recipe was created by Beatrice Cooke, director of the test kitchens in Chicago. It has other good ingredients too, points out Miss Cooke, such as whipped cream, semi-sweet chocolate pieces, rice cereal and coconut. A spoonful of whipped cream atop each serving makes it party fare.

Chocolate Crunch Dessert (Six servings) 1 6-ounce package (1 cup) semi-sweet chocolate pieces 3 tablespoons butter 2 cups crisp rice cereal, crushed 1/2 cup moist shredded coconut 1 tablespoon plain gelatin 1/4 cup chocolate milk or dairy drink 1 1/2 cups scalded chocolate milk 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 cup whipping cream, whipped In top of double boiler, melt chocolate pieces and butter over hot water. Remove from heat. Stir in cereal and coconut. Press firmly on bottom of buttered 8-inch square pan; chill until firm. Soften gelatin in 1/2 cup cold chocolate milk for 5 minutes. Add scalded chocolate milk and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add vanilla. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat with rotary beater. Fold in whipped cream. Spoon into chocolate crust. Chill until firm. Cut into squares.

Cancer Increases Foundation Says More Each Day

NEW YORK — Although great progress has been made recently in cancer research and treatment, this disease constitutes a "steadily increasing health problem" in this country, Health Information Foundation reported today.

In its monthly statistical bulletin, Progress in Health Services, the Foundation pointed out that more than 250,000 Americans died of cancer last year. The present death rate is about 60 per cent higher than the 1900 rate. During the last half-century cancer has risen from seventh to second leading cause of death.

Certain types of cancer—notably leukemia and cancer of the respiratory system—have become steadily more important causes of death in the last 25 years, the Foundation report stated.

On the other hand, cancer of the digestive system has shown a relative decline during the same time period, although it still kills more people than any other type of cancer. Cancer of the digestive system caused half of all the cancer deaths in 1930, but only one out of three such deaths in 1958.

Another cancer trend noted by the Foundation is a shift in the sex ratio. Early in the century more of the cancer victims were women, but the male mortality rate now exceeds the female by 22 per cent.

The mortality rate for women has been declining since the 1930's. In contrast, said the Foundation, male mortality from cancer has continued to rise—"in part because of the rapid rise of respiratory cancer among men, but also because in general cancers afflicting males more often occur in less accessible sites."

George Bugbee, Foundation President, commented that "although cancer is an increasingly serious health problem for the population as a whole, the prospects for the individual cancer victim are brighter today than ever before."

"Whereas a few years ago only

one cancer patient out of every four survived for five years or more, now the record shows one of every three so surviving. Thanks to modern methods of treatment, an estimated 150,000 individuals were saved from cancer deaths last year."

The picture would be brighter, Mr. Bugbee continued, if more people saw their doctors for regular checkups so that the disease would more often be diagnosed in its early stages. He cited a recent survey, sponsored by the Foundation and conducted by the University of Chicago's aNational Opinion Research Center, which showed that 45 per cent of the persons in the 65-and-over group had not had a medical checkup for five years or more. A quarter of all the older people had never had such an examination. Yet more than half the cancer deaths nowadays occur among people in this age group.

Medical knowledge has advanced so much recently that the public has reason to expect that better ways of diagnosing and curing cancer will soon be found," Mr. Bugbee added. "For the foreseeable future, though, the main hope for any individual lies in early detection of the disease. The person who fails to consult a physician regularly is depriving himself of the benefits modern medical science could give him."
