2 cups crisp rice cereal, crushed ½ cup moist shredded coconut tablespoon plain gelatin 4 cup chocolate milk or dairy

34 cups scalded chocolate milk teaspoon vanilla In top of double boiler, melt chocolate pieces and butter over hot water. Remove from heat. Stir in cereal and coconut. Press firmly on bottom of buttered 8-inch square pan; chill crust until firm. Soften gelatin in ¼ cup cold chocolate milk for 5 minutes. Add scalded chocolate milk and stir until gelatin is dissolved. Add vanilla. Chill until slightly thickened. Beat with rotary beater. Fold in whip-


