Rural Teachers Vote 'For State Council'

The Nebraska Rural School Boards association held their annual meeting in Alliance Tuesday. Mrs. Fritz Krause of Alliance was elected president for a three year term succeeding Arnold Noriskov of Albion.

It was voted to continue membership in the Nebraska council for education. Valentine was named as the 1960 meeting place the first week in February.

This being a legislative year, quite a number of bills were brought up for discussion. LB 247 created much interest as it was up for hearing in Lincoln the same day as the meeting.

Delegates had been sent from the western part of the state to oppose the bill. There were some 500 present in the east tense chambers in opposition to the bill, clearly showing where the good majority stood on this issue. This organization felt, as a whole, that the bill, if enacted, would allow the state board of education, by rules and regulations, too much power for any one board.

When sifted down, it would be a final stroke to wipe out local control. A motion was made to send a telegram to the educational committee, then in session stating that this organization is opposed to the passage of LB 247. The motion was passed unanimously, and telegram was sent immediately from the floor.

LB 237, would provide one single school district within each county. This was so similar to the old K-12 bill proposed a few years ago, it was unanimously opposed.

LB 567, taking away from state commissioner of education power to discontinue a point was subject to change by courts. We favored this bill.

LB 559, extending to Sept. 15, 1960 the time during which certain teachers' certificates shall be issued. Unanimously favored this bill.

LB 599, changing method of holding school redistricting election. This bill would have each district vote separately rather than county. Would safeguard the minority districts being "railroaded", unanimously carried.

LB 603, dropping from five to two the number of pupils required for reopening of school in a district that has been contracting for instruction of pupils. Motion carried.

It was voted that we ask Senators Gerdes and Nelson and Dr. Raymond Gilmore, state educational board member, to attend the annual meeting in Valentine next year. This was an active meeting accomplished a great deal. We felt benefited by having had the privilege, as delegates, to attend.
