

O'Neill Spanish-American War Vet Dies in Grand Island Hospital Tuesday

One of the only two remaining Spanish American War veterans in the O'Neill area died Tuesday in a Grand Island hospital.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow (Friday) for Mr. Charles Harding at the O'Neill Methodist church at 2 p.m.

The other survivor of that war in this area is Henry D. Grady who served in Company "I" from O'Neill.

Mr. Harding went west in the 90s and returned home in time to join the volunteers to go to Cuba.

He was a former deputy sheriff of Holt county under Sheriff Charles E. Hall.

nings Bryan with Company "M" of the 3rd Regiment of Nebraska Volunteer Infantry.

Old Frontier records show that only one other man might still be living that served with the "M" outfit. The man is Arthur Coykendall, who visited with Mr. Harding and Mr. Grady a few years ago.

When the company was formed in 1898, O'Neill was the site of drilling each day until the Nebraska troops were called to the war. The company then assembled in Fort Omaha, the rendezvous for the regiment.
