



Committee Begins Redistricting Discussion; Speak of Central High School Near Inman



April Meeting Set For Further

School Planning

Serious consideration of a cour ty-wide comprehensive redistricting plan for the 142 school districts in Holt county is being made by the county redistricting committee.

Merwin French jr., of Page, chairman of the local committee, said the group of eight members were beginning to discuss plans to better educational conditions in the area.

According to state law, the committee must come up with a comprehensive plan within a year of the present group will automatically disolve.

In addition to French, the present members include Louis Kopecky jr., of Inman. vice chairman, Eric Dankert of Chambers, Dale Mitchell of Amelia, Mrs. Fred Boettcher of Atkinson, Walter Fick of Inman, James Allen of Stewart and Miss Alice French, the county superintendent (a non voting member).

French pointed out that although no deminite plan has been adopted, consideration has been given to the building of a central high school near Inman for the communities of Inman, Page, Ewing and Orchard.

French said it appeared that a meeting of all school boards would soon be necessary to discuss the proposal.


