O'Neill American Legion Post 93 CLUB RULES:

1. Any American Legion or American Legion Auxiliary member will be admitted by current membership card. Cards must be exhibited upon demand.
2. All American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary members will be permitted to bring ONE guest—either a lady or gentleman—into the club with them on their card. There will be no exception to this rule.
3. Each guest and their sponsor must sign the "Guest Register". No guests under the age of 21 will be admitted.
4. All members and guests are requested to conduct themselves in a ladylike or gentlemanly manner at all times. No profane or obscene language, or loud or boisterous talk will be permitted in the club or on the premises.
5. All services furnished by the club must be paid for in cash.
6. The Attendant shall have the privilege and authority to request any member or guest, at any time, to withdraw from the Club's premises should their manner or conduct conflict with these rules. Any such member may appeal from the Attendant's action to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may exclude any member from the Club for such time as in their discretion seems proper.
7. No spiking of drinks will be permitted. Each member must take his liquor or beer to the bartender, who will issue a ticket for the beer or liquor, and mix and serve the drinks ordered.
8. No alcoholic beverages will be served to anyone under 21 years of age.
9. Please keep in mind that this Club is established primarily for the use and benefit of Veterans. If you are a guest, always be mindful of the fact that your conduct is chargeable to your host.
