Former Sterile Farm Is Now Productive

Ogallala—Dr. Charles Mueller and his son, Charles T. Mueller, took over a practically sterile farm of 260 acres one mile south of here in 1939 and by hard work have increased their holdings to 720 of the most productive acres in the state.

Their work is a living example of what can be done with land even after it has gone to "salt grass." "People said we were crazy when we paid \$33 an acre for this land in 1939," said Dr. Mueller. "I take delight in bringing out some of those critics and asking: 'who's crazy now?'"

The younger Mueller told a clinic held by the Nebraska Association of Distributors' Association how the land was developed.

"One of our first moves was to install nine irrigation wells," he said. "We then began work of leveling off the land. We changed the course of an irrigation ditch, put down a 100-foot sprinkler well and irrigated 70 acres of alfalfa. We dried up or diverted a number of sloughs saving some 50 acres of soil."

Off of those 50 acres the Mueller's now raise from 75 to 150 bushels of corn per acre. They are still adding to their holdings. They profess not to know their exact worth, but last year they bought an adjoining 135 acres at \$200 per acre. This land is somewhat improved, but the Mueller's promise to improve it still further.

Dr. Mueller, a veterinarian, devotes most of his time to his profession, leaving his son in charge

of the farm. "Their acres, to the naked eye, look about as level as land can be made, but Charles isn't satisfied. He said he will continue the leveling process until all danger from erosion has been eliminated. He has built dikes to prevent floods from heavy rains washing away crops."

Usually the Mueller's rotate crops much in this fashion: Corn, three years; sugar beets, one year; alfalfa, four years.

The Mueller's employ four full time workers. They built a cement silo, 150 feet long, 50 feet wide and 10 feet deep several years ago. Later they doubled the size of the silo, but this time they used baled straw as sides. They feed most of their corn and alfalfa to their cattle and usually feed out about 1,500 head.

"Without irrigation it would have been impossible for us to survive," said Charles Mueller. "There are thousands upon thousands of acres in western Nebraska that is no worse than ours was when we took over. As a matter of fact, some 50 per cent of some counties is waste land. But I believe practically all of it can be brought into top production by people not afraid of hard work."

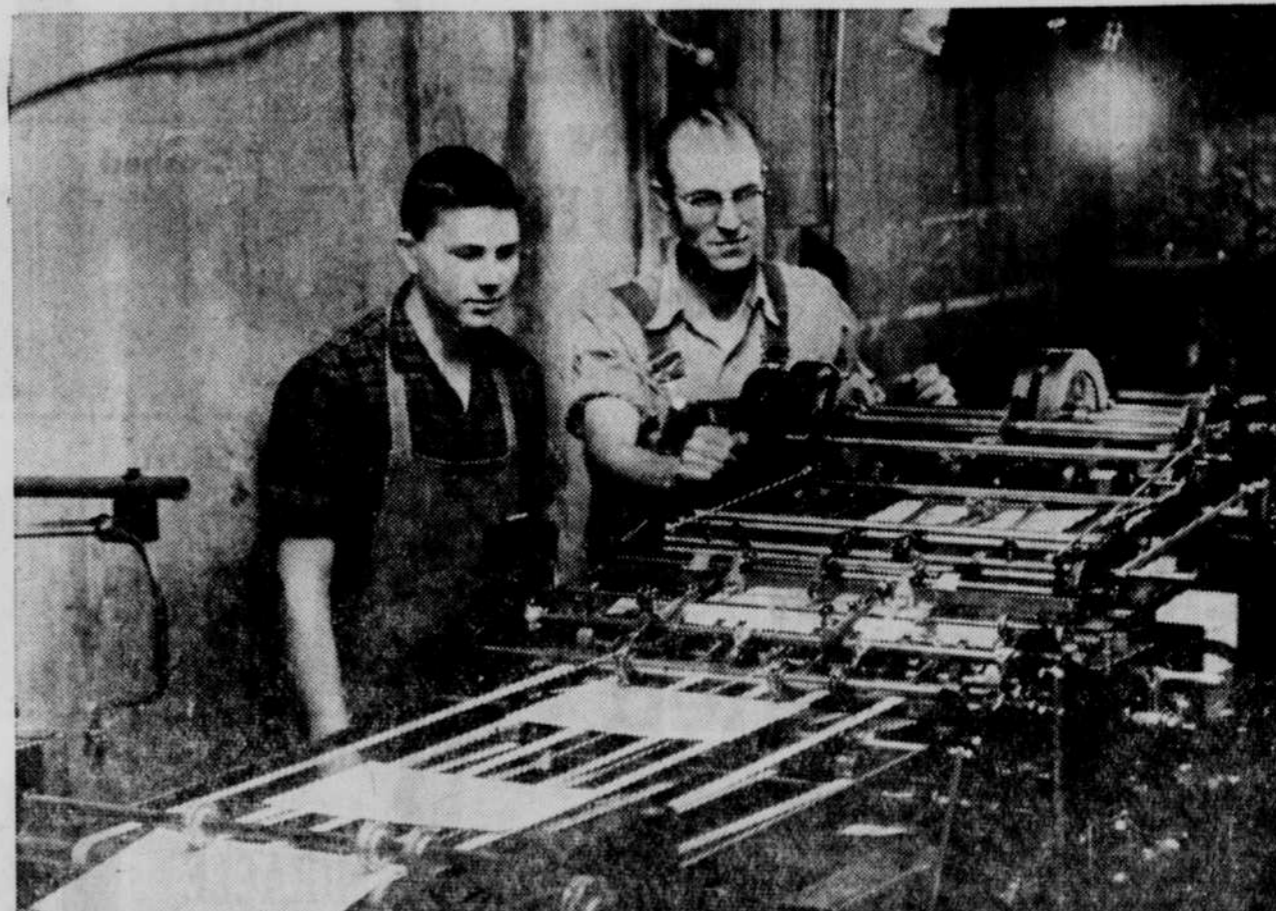
