

Teacher Travels 2,000 Miles A Month Inman, Page and Clearwater On List

When you drive 2,000 miles a month, see to it that students from five north-central Nebraska schools get the chance to learn music, and arrange for at least two concerts a year, then you love music.

And a lot of people will love you. Leonard Sawyer, a music teacher from Royal, has been doing just that for the past 12 years.

"I've watched many of my students grow up, go to college and continue their studies in music," he said.

The students he was referring to, come from Inman, Clearwater, Page, Meadow Grove in addition to his own home town.

But Mr. Sawyer's students are more than just students. They jump at the chance to play under his baton even after they graduate from high school.

"Each time we have a mass spring or mid-winter concert, many students who have graduated come back to play with us," he said.

Mr. Sawyer's teaching job takes him to the five schools at least once each week. A good part of his time is spent traveling from school to school.

"Yes, you've got to love music and children," the band master said. "But what I really want to teach my children is how to be good Christian men and women."

At the end of the mass spring concert held this year in Inman, featuring all the band students from the five schools, you could see the respect in the children's eyes.

"The children have given me so many things," Mr. Sawyer said as he pointed to his gold-plated baton and the most recent gift, a charcoal brazer.
