Wayne Harmon Suggests Caramel Spice Cake

If your family clamors for home-made cake that has real flavor, try this caramel spice cake recipe to us by Wayne Harmon, salesman of the local Meadow Gold Dairy.

Buttermilk helps make the cake feather-light and fine textured, reports Beatrice Cooke, director of the company's test kitchens in Chicago, where the recipe originated. Cinnamon and cloves lend spicy flavor while brown sugar gives it the caramel effect.

Caramel Spice Cake
(Two 9-inch layers)

3/4 cup butter
1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed
1/2 cup granulated sugar
1 teaspoon vanilla
2 egg yolks
2 1/2 cups sifted cake flour
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/4 teaspoon cloves
1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/4 cups buttermilk
2 egg whites, beaten stiff
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

Cream together butter and sugars until light and fluffy. Beat in vanilla and egg yolks. Add sifted dry ingredients alternately with buttermilk; mix until smooth. Gradually beat in 1/2 cup brown sugar into egg whites; continue beating until mixture is stiff and glossy. Fold into batter. Pour into 2 greased and floured 9-inch cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Cool on cake rack 10 minutes. Remove from pans and cool. Frost with a seven minute frosting.
