Funny-Man Tacker Gets Rodeo Billing

Ike Tacker, a top rodeo performer who is known to millions of fans throughout the country, will be a headline attraction at the O'Neill rodeo to be held Sunday and Monday, June 12-13. The event will be sponsored by the O'Neill Saddle club in cooperation with the Chamber of Commerce and the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

All events will be held at the Saddle club arena one-half mile straight east of O'Neill.

Funny-man Tacker has appeared at key rodeos from the West coast to Virginia and from the Canadian border to the Rio Grande.

Ike, one of the best riders and doggers, started riding bulls in 1931. Several years later he started entering in the bareback riding the all-around championship did so well at these that he went on to within one notch of winning the all-around rhapsodship of the old National Rodeo association.

It was quite by accident that Ike started fighting bulls. At a rodeo at Marfa, Tex., the regular bullfighter was unable to work and Ike was asked to take his place. After that debut he was asked to work several more rodeos, and finally took bullfighting in earnest. Today he ranks as one of the best.
