

Two cups uncooked rhubarb, one tablespoon flour, one teaspoon grated orange rind, one teaspoon cinnamon, one cup sugar, one cup flour, two teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/1 cup shortening, one egg, three tablespoons milk, two tablespoons orange juice, three tablespoons sugar.

Arrange rhubarb in a greased 9-inch cake pan. Sprinkle with a mixture of a tablespoon of flour, orange rind, cinnamon and one cup sugar. Sift the flour, sugar, baking powder and salt together and cut in the shortening. Beat egg and add milk and mix with dry ingredients. Drop by tablespoons over rhubarb and spread with spatula.
