Both Harry and Wayne were presented pens.—By James Gilg.

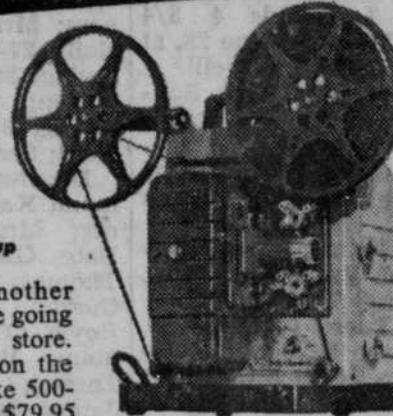
